PARIS, Feb. 9—One hundred million francs worth of former Russian imperial jewels will be sold by the Soviets in Paris, it is reported by jewelers, several of whom have been approached by Soviet officials.

Twelve or fifteen million francs worth have already been sold here. It is reported they have been taken from th Crown jewels, but this is unlikely, for the Bolsheviki have guarded these closely in the Kremlin.


