Board of Trade Council to Write to Ottawa About It

WORK ON NATIONAL POLICY FOR CANADA

C. P. R. Advertising Folder Commended—West Indies and Other Matters

It was decided this morning at a meeting of the Council of the Saint John Board of Trade, to write to Dr. H. L. Brittain of the Canadian Tax Conference staff, suggesting that his organization draft some simpler form of income tax statement which could be presented to the Federal Government to replace the form now in use and which it was felt very few people were able to interpret correctly.

D. W. Leighton undertook to forward from Bermuda to the board the names of the delegates from the West Indies to the trade conference in Ottawa on June 19 and to deliver to each the invitation of the Saint John Board of Trade to spend a day in this city en route to the conference.

National Policy. It was decided to appoint a small committee of the board to look into and suggest matters which might be brought before the gathering of boards of trade to be held in Toronto next fall to try to arrive at some national policy which would be acceptable to all parts of Canada.

The board has been advised of proposed changes in the Canadian express classifications and the traffic committee are taking this up with the local interests affected.

It was reported to the board that W. Shivers Fisher would be going to the annual meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers Association, at Hamilton, June 14, and would represent the board at that gathering.

The advertising given the city in the last folder of the Canadian Pacific Railway was highly commended by the council and the secretary instructed to write them a letter of appreciation.

SALES TAX. It was reported that the board was still working to have the sales tax on canned fish reduced to the same as that on vegetables. At present the former pays a tax of 10 per cent, and the latter 2 1/2 per cent.

The board was asked by the Gustafman consular general at Washington to recommend a local man to act as consul at that port and they have recommended Frederick Stewart, of McAvity & Sons, Ltd., for the post.

It was said that the meeting to be addressed by F. B. Macdonald, of the Board of Trade rooms on Friday at 3 o'clock would be open to any one interested in West Indian trade, whether a member of the board or not.

Hon. Dr. Baxter Is Away To Ottawa

Hon. Dr. John B. Baxter, K. C., M. P., new leader of the Opposition party for New Brunswick, left last evening for Ottawa to attend the sessions of the House of Commons. George B. Jones, M. P., Apohaqui, also returned to Ottawa. Prior to his departure, Dr. Baxter said it would not be necessary for him to resign his federal seat until May 31, as he had been named as a candidate for a provincial constituency and the writ for the provincial election issued.



BUILT IN SAINT JOHN

Many favorable comments have been heard with reference to the two new street cars, built in the New Brunswick Power Company's shops in Westworth street, and which are now in service. They were constructed under the supervision of R. Harris, master mechanic. They are known as light weight, single truck double end one man cars. Their dimensions are: Length over all, 31 feet; width over all, 7 feet 10 inches; body, 29 feet; vestibule, 5 feet; seating capacity, 30. The body of the cars are of steel, with arched roofs and ventilators. The wheels are 35 inch solid rolled steel. They are painted a Brunswick green, with cream trimmings, mahogany racks and buff roof for the vestibule. The interior is finished with light mahogany and cream ceilings for the interior. The seats are natural wood finish, with galvanized iron upholstery.
