NEW BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK BUILDING AT FLORENCEVILLE, N. B.

B. Mooney & Sons Get Contract—Mr. Brodie Arranges Contracts for Campbellton Structures

On plans of F. Neil Brodie, architect, the contract for a new building for the Bank of New Brunswick in Florenceville, N. B., has been awarded to Messrs. B. Mooney & Sons. Excavation work will be done this fall and building commenced in the spring. While no price could be obtained it is understood to be in the neighborhood of \$14,000. Plans are being prepared by Mr. Brodie for work in connection with the new provincial sanitarium at River Glade and it is understood these will be dealt with by the government at an early date.

Mr. Brodie has just returned from Campbellton where he awarded the contract for the B. A. Mowatt brick block to J. & D. A. Harquill, contractors. The new structure which will be a very fine one, 33x80, will be two stories with electric elevators, steam heating, etc. It will cost in the vicinity of \$16,000. Mr. Brodie is also preparing plans for the new Church of England there. Tenders will be called some time in February. This structure will be a handsome one of brick and freestone, 40x75.

REPORT BY VICE-CONSUL ATTRACTS

New York Man Writes of Taking up Suggestion for Building Apartment Houses Here Such as Are in New York

The following report by Clarence Carrigan, American vice-consul here, appeared in the consular trade reports of September 29 and has already borne fruit. Mr. Carrigan wrote as follows: APARTMENT HOUSES NEEDED IN CANADA.

"Report was made from this office in 1909 of the necessity for more hotels and apartment houses in St. John. This need has steadily increased, and seems to open up a good field for investment. There is not an up-to-date apartment house in St. John; the nearest approach to it is a hotel building which has lately been remodelled into an apartment house, and I am told that the apartments are renting readily, although the improvements are not yet completed.

"An apartment house built on modern lines should prove a paying proposition here, as apartments of ordinary size attractively finished should easily bring \$30 to \$20 a month. The early completion of the G. and T. Terminal in St. John, and other improvements which this harbor will see a very short time, will increase the need of house accommodation here, and this should be a field worthy of investigation."

He received yesterday a letter from R. L. Somers, 17 State street, New York, referring to the suggestion in Mr. Carrigan's report and adding:—"If I could get in touch with interested parties in the city of St. John, I might be willing to undertake the proposition you have suggested, namely the erection of a modern apartment house of the type generally used in New York City."

POLITICAL SHUFFLE THAT IS TALKED OF

Possibilities Following on Mr. Hazen Moving From Provincial Into Federal Politics

With the likely translation of Premier Hazen to the federal cabinet, there has been much quiet discussion in Conservative circles as to what will be the outcome of the provincial shuffle that is bound to follow. It has been said here that with Mr. Crockett appointed to the railway commission, a safe seat would be found for Hon. Mr. Hazen. Then it is figured that should Senator Josiah Wood be given the lieutenant governorship, a place would be found for Dr. Daniel in the senate, opening the city and county seat.

Recorder Baxter is being urged for the legislature to assume the attorney generalship. It has been said that this proposition was discussed at a recent convocation of local Conservatives, but the opinion was for the guides, Charles and Fred Cole of Coles Island.

Then W. Frank Hatheway is said to have ambitions also, either for a seat in the federal house or a place in the reconstructed provincial cabinet. Miles E. Agr is another Conservative who, it is understood, now desires recognition at the hands of his party. He, so report says, has been offered a chance for the candidacy in the county at the next general provincial elections. Should Hon. Mr. Hazen go to York, in the event of Mr. Crockett getting a place on the railway commission, Mr. Hatheway is said to be anxious to take a shy at Dr. Daniel's seat, if the latter goes to the senate.

COAL GOES UP IN MAINE; NO CHANGE IN ST. JOHN PRICES

Although advice received from across the border as to the effect that coal was advanced 50 cents a ton in Maine on October 1, the indications in St. John at the present time are reported to be that the prices will remain the same as now. The supply in New Brunswick is very good and is expected to be all through the winter.

A NEW KIND OF REPORT

Citizen Carrying Lighted Cigar on Sand Point Wharf and Refusing to Extinguish It

John McKelvey has been reported by Sergt. Finlay for violating rules 10 and 12 of the law relating to public wharves and warehouses of the city and harbor of St. John by carrying a lighted cigar on No. 6 wharf in the west side yesterday afternoon, and refusing to extinguish it when requested.

PATROL WAGON AND AMBULANCE NOW IN NEW QUARTERS

The patrol wagon and the ambulance are now comfortably stored in the Victoria stables in Coburg street, near the corner of Union. The patrol was given its first run last night when policeman Lucas was called upon to arrest a man on Drunkenness charge, in Erin street. He has the distinction of being the first prisoner to enjoy a ride in the new wagon.

When the patrol is needed, it is necessary for the policeman to go to a nearby telephone and call up Main 813. With the police alarm system this would be done away with as there would be an alarm at various street corners. However, there is a driver always on hand for both the patrol and the ambulance so it does not take long to have the wagon ready to answer the call. Two fire horses have been secured for the work and will be available at all times.
