

HORRIBLE LEPROSY.

DR. O'DONNE". US DECAYING EXAMPLES ARRET'S IN NEW YORK. ferrible Story of the Scourge-Ame ing the Disc

New York, Aug. 2-Two swful cases of Chinese leprosy have been brought here by Dr. F. C. O'Donnell, formerly a mem-ber of the constitutional convention of California, a man who has spent half a lifetime and a fortune in the anti-Chinese activation. The two of the thousand Chinese lepers of San Francisco that he Calless lepers of Sab Francisco take he has brought with him are Wo Lin and Ah Chin. The face of the former is frightful-ly svollen and the flesh lies on it in folds so that it has the appearance of being cor-rugated. Their heads are twice the nat-ural size. Neither can see except by turping his avag un taward the abr. Wo urning his eyes up toward the sky. Lin has lost all his fingers and half of each foot. His loft leg is as large as a pillar. His mouth is drawn to one side and his ace emaciated from the destruction of its muscles. Each has tubercular laprosy The doctor, who is familiar with the dis ease says that they are the worst specimens of lepers he has ever seen. He discovered them four days before he left for the east ving two stories underground in Bull Run alley, between Pacific street and Broadway in San Francisco.

WHAT THE DOCTOR SAYS.

In an interview the doctor said : "My object in coming east is to educate the people on the Chinese question. They seem not to understand it."

"But suppose you had spread leprosy among the people in such an exhibition ?" "There is no danger so long as you do not touch a leper. The disease is conta-gous, but safe to exhibit under restrict-ions. Just before I left San Francisco I counted 240 lepers. I went among them with rubber gloves on my hands and a disinfectant of carbolic acid, oreesete, and oil of euclyptus tree. Lepcoy is abso-lutely incurable, and is on the increase in California. The lepers hide in dark damp cellars, where the sunlight never penetrates. The light of day seems to olind their sight and aggravates the itching pain that accompanies the disease. White people have caught the disease from contact with the patients. Miss Eckel, a fine-looking and reputable white girl, who lived with her parents on Powell street, was pushed against a leper, and


