Water Let Into The New Basin.

FIRST PRACTICAL TEST IS BEING MADE THIS AFTERNOON-SOME DESCRIPTION OF CHATHAM'S BIG RESERVOIR.

The water was turned into the sedimentation basin this afternoon at four o'clock and the result is awaited with more or less interest as the final disposition of a disputed point will soon be arrived at. There have been those who have found fault with the basin, declaring that the puddle clay that was to make its bottom and sides waterproof was too sandy to an swer the purpose. They confidently predicted that the water would leak away almost, if not quite, as rapidly as pumped in.

Superintendent Jones has all along maintained that these people were off in their facts and that the puddle was

ITS DIMENSIONS.

The builth is an immense affair and at the present juncture a few particulars as to its size and construction will not be amiss. The extreme length over embankments, from outside to outside, is 900 feet; and the extreme width 180 feet. The depth of the exceptation, below datum, at the south end is 12 feet 10 ûnches and at the north end 10 feet 2 ûnches. Width of excaptation at datum level is 112 feet. Width of basin at bottom, south end 37 ft. 6 in., at north end 81 ft. 6 in. Length of excaptation at datum level, 832 feet. Length of basin at toutom 797-ft. 6 in. Width of basin at toutom 100 feet. Length of the single of embanisment at datum level 34 feet; and at top 16 feet. Height of embanisment above datum level, 6 feet.

The entire inner face is rammed with clay to a depth of about two feet and this is coated with six inches of blue clay. The sittes are limed at the top, to a width of four feet, with small coable stones; and the corners

the top, to a winth of four feet, with small cobble stones; and the corners are rounded off into quarter-circles. In the basin stand three brick towers enters near the bottom of the basin. At the opposite, or near end of basin is the tower by which the water is re? ceived from the basin and through the filters into the stand pipe and thence to the mains. This tower has three openings at regular intervals. The lower ones are provided with valves by means of which they can be opened or closed as the depth of the water requires, the object being to take the supply from the surface, this part having been most exposed to the action of supply from the surface, this part having been most exposed to the action of the air. The water is conducted to its filters by means of pipes which are laid in the bed of the baisin in its entire length. In the south westerly corner of the reservoir is a third tower to be used for drainage purposes—to let off the water in case of necessity.

SOME NOTES.

The amount of easth excavated was \$1,750 cubic yards, Of this, 11,245 cubic yards were sequired for the embankment, and 20,505 yards were removed. The mean depth of the water will be sixteen feet, and the capacity of the basin, the water one foot below the top of the bank; is 8,454,900 imperial smallens.

According to the specifications the basin is to be subjected to a two weeks' test before being accepted by the city. In the summer time the water from the In the summer time the water from the river can be exygenized by being thrown into the air before falling into the basin. This is supposed to greatly improve it. It is said that as a consequence of going over Niagara Falls the waters of Lake Ontario are the purest and best of any in the great lakes.

Bathing and suiciding in the basin will be strictly prohibited. Anybody committing either of these offences will be liable to prosecution.

STEATIER IDLEWILD BEACHED.

During a dense fog which settled on the river Wednesday morning the steamer Idewiid of the Star Cole Line ran ashoe on Walpole Island opposite algonac at about six oclock. The City of Toledo belonging to the same company arrived about 9 o'clock and took her passengers and part of her freight. The Auxiliary boat Saginaw and the tug Boyington, of Port Huron, were on hand about 10 o'clock, and after a hand pull succeeded in pulling the Idlewild, which was high and dry on the beach, into deep water at 12.30 o'clock. Beyond a little smashing at the stern caused by the moving of freight the Idlewild was not damaged. She proceeded on her way to Detroit.

John Twohey Stands Convicted

OF DEFRAUDING THE CITY TREAS-URER--HE GETS THREE MONTHS IN THE COM-

This morning John Twohey stood in the dock at the police court to receive judgment on the charge of defraud-

When asked if he had anything to say Twohay petterated his denial and gave instances to show that he had been previously honest.

The Judge said he could not accept the prisoner's denial, and the only matter to be considered was that of punishment. One leading Judge held that persons with previous good characters should be punished severely and it would prevent many first offences. But he was rather inclined to take into consideration Twohey's previous

character and pass a very light, almost nominal, sentence. But he trusted its lesson would be sufficient. He sentenced the prisoner to three months in the county jail at hard labor. LOCATING THE LIGHTS.
