

other side of the river are Mr. W. Allen's cabinet factory, where the manufacturing of furniture is carried on in all its branches, besides undertaking and wood turning, and Mr. Robert Millen's planing mill and stave factory, where custom planing and wood working is done and staves, shingles and heading manufactured. On the road leading from the village to the railway station is the new saw-mill, lately erected by Gibson Bros., and rented by Slichter & Detivilier. It is driven by steam and turns out large quantities of lumber. An oatmeal mill to be driven by water is in process of erection.

MERCANTILE.—Mr. John Sanderson owns a fine brick store and has a large and well established business, and Mr. John Moffat and Bell & Shaver have each excellent general stores well stocked with usual merchandise. Mr. Robinson's drug store, in which the office of the Montreal Telegraph Company is located, shows a good stock of drugs and fancy articles. Mr. Wm. Heald, Mr. Robert Scott, Mr. William Harrison and Miss Mackenzie have first-class grocery and provision stores. There are also the representatives of the usual mechanical trades. Mr. Thos. Sanders and Mr. Thomas McDonald carry on the harness and saddlery business, and Messrs. Davidson, Orr and Hemphill each do a good business in the blacksmithing department. Charles Holland and Peter Eamer have good waggon and carriage works, and Mr. Peter Moir and Mr. W. B. Barker represent the shoemaking interests. Mr. Robert Paulin has a hardware shop and tinsmithing combined. In the tailoring line there are Mr. John Knuston and Mr. Robt. Dickson. The latter is postmaster, and has, in addition to his tailoring business, a good stock of books, stationery and fancy articles. Mr. John B. Voght, does gunsmithing and general repairing. Messrs. John McLaughlin and James Orr have livery stables in connection with their other vocations. There are four taverns, owned and occupied by James Crawford, Jno. Goston, Wm. Johnson and Jno. McLaughlin. There are three churches in the village and three resident clergymen. The Presbyterian Church is a large frame building capable of seating five hundred, and is under the charge of the Rev. George Brown. The Congregational body is presided over by the Rev. John Kidson, and meets in the public hall. The Methodist Church is a frame building, seated for two hundred and fifty, and the Church of England Chapel is capable of holding about the same number, and is under the care of the Rev. Mr. Woodburn. The school house is a brick building, situated on the outskirts of the village, with Mr. David Walker as principal.

SOCIETIES.—The Masons, Oddfellows, Orange and Good Templars Societies have all branches working in the village. There is also a Mechanics' Institute, with a good library in connection, which has been lately greatly increased.
