This abnormal rainfall over Northern British Columbia was caused by the passage of a series of low barometer areas, which spread across this district from the Pacific to Cariboo and Alberta.

As the barometer remained comparatively high off the coasts of Vancouver Island and the North Pacific states and was unusually low over the mountains, the winds were chiefly off the cool waters of the Pacific and moderate to fresh in force. The only rainfall of the week on the Lower Mainfand and Vancouver Island occurred during the night of Thursday, 21st, due to one of the above mentioned rain areas crossing the province further south. These areas, after traversing the Rockies, have fortunately given very little rain in the Territories, except in the form of light local showers and thunderstorms.

Reports from the Upper Mainland state that the crops are good in all sections and that harvesting is in full operation.

The weather has also been most favorable for the crops in the Territories and Manitoba, as it has been fine and moderately warm.
