ANTWERP, Belgium, May 27.—The British steamer Huddersfield, Captain Hamon, which salled from this port resterday evening for Grimsby, England, collided with the Norwegian steamer Uto. The Huddersfield went down. From fifteen to twenty of her passengers, mostly seamen returning to England, it is believed, were crushed in the collision. The bows of the Uto were damaged.

The survivors of the Huddersfield's passengers and crew were picked up by the Uto, which landed them here. The survivors say the dead were nearly all crushed while asleep in their berths. The collision was so sudden that there was no time to launch the Huddersfield's boats. The disaster is attributed to the electric lights of a dredger, anchored in find river, which dazzled the pilots of the colliding steamers, who were thus unable to see the danger of collision in time to avert the crash.

The Uto was struck on the port size by the Huddersfield, whose immigrants were asleep in the forecabin.
