WANT THE PIKE LAW REPEALED

A local lumberman stated yesterday that The St. John Lumber Company, owning a mill at Vanburen, Me., were working to have the Pike law repealed in Maine. This is the law which permits American citizens to cut lumber in the United States, bring it to the province of New Brunswick for manufacture and take it back free of duty. The action of the St. John Lumber Co., the local lumberman said, arose out of a spirit of spite. Millmen at the mouth of the St. John river did not want piers in the river at Van Buren, and the above named company wanted them, and because local men were agitating against the piers the company were seeking to repeal the Pike law. The local lumberman, however, stated that he had no fears of any immediate repeal of the law.

The first appearance in this city of Edward Terry and his London company of players, from Terry's Theatre on the Strand, will take place at York Theatre on Thursday next. Mr. Terry is now under the management of J. H. Miller & Co., the noted firm of theatrical managers, who have handled more prominent foreign stars than any other firm in America. In England, Mr. Terry ranks as one of the most popular as well as one of the most respected of actors. If there were not a great deal of human nature in Mr. Terry's stage figure he would never have achieved a reputation such as he now enjoys, but his humanity is a humanity "after his kind." He is a mirror for up to nature, but it is a mirror such as one happens upon now and then outside the premises of a cheap restaurant, in which features are broadened or lengthened into a distortion—a caricature which is amusing, as it shows human nature as it might be under exceptional conditions. The likeness is not absolutely lost, but it is sufficiently merged in broad caricature that can afford to be amused at it, and to enjoy a laugh at his own expense. So is it with some of the impersonations of Mr. Terry. They are so funny, so obviously exaggerated, that the specific purpose of tickling the imagination, so honestly outside the pale of ordinary experience, and yet so instinct with the perception of the foibles and fancies of human nature, that we laugh at them, and jubilantly recognize in them a clever study of the ridiculous side of our neighbors.
