Government Meeting At Newton Tuesday

Large Audience Present. Accords Unanimous Endorsement to Policy of Flemming Government—Frequent and Hearty Applause.

Sussex, June 5.—A meeting in the interests of Messrs. Jones, Murray and Dickson was held in the hall at Newton where the opposition candidates held forth last Saturday night, was addressed by Ralph St. J. Freeze and Fred M. Sprout on Tuesday evening, the 4th inst., and it is needless to say that any arguments presented by Messrs. Pearson, Flevelling and Wetmore on Saturday evening last were shattered beyond any hope of redemption. This was made fully apparent by the continuous applause that was given the speakers.

Shortly after 8 o'clock the hall which was comfortably filled, among those present being quite a number of ladies. A motion was made nominating Chas. Tainyn as chairman of the meeting and carried. He performed the duty required of him in a very happy manner introducing the speakers, Mr. Freeze and Mr. Sprout.

Mr. Freeze on being introduced was heartily received and at once plunged into his subject in a businesslike manner, advancing many strong and vigorous arguments in defence of the present government and making comparisons that carried conviction to the minds of all present, plainly showing up the fallacies and erroneous statements made by the opposition speakers in this campaign and the opposition press in the province, prophesying that on the 20th of June next the government supporters would be elected with large majorities, which sentiment was vigorously applauded as he finished his remarks fully and completely with applause and continued.

Mr. Sprout, ex-M.P.P., who was received with applause and continued. In his opening remarks he took occasion to contradict in the most emphatic manner the statement that had been heralded all over the country as to be and his colleagues had been referred to various matters wherein pledges had been made by the present government to reform the loose financial methods of doing the business of the province employed by the late administration and proved most conclusively that this had been done. He also referred to the leasing of the cost of school books to the people of the province, which had cost the province less than \$1,000 up to the present date. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must submit to the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district, entry by post made to the mail, a description by certain conditions by letter, either non-claimant brother or sister of landowner homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead or on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of land in his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead or on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of land in his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead or on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
