

"PREPARE FOR THE WORST BUT HOPE FOR THE BEST"

This is the Advice of British War Chief in Address to Lincolnshire Audience—Allies Winning the War Slowly but Surely, Says Sir William Robertson.

London, Oct. 4.—General Sir William Robertson, chief of the imperial staff at army headquarters, said in a speech today at Dalderby, Lincolnshire, that while the Allies were winning the war slowly but surely, he wished to impress upon his hearers the necessity of procuring more men for the army and munition factories. In this connection, he said, he had a serious word of warning to give. "We are not justified in expecting to win the war," he said, "unless the service of every man and woman in the country be utilized to the fullest extent. "We must be under no delusions," he continued, "as to the end or probable duration of this great struggle. We must be prepared to continue for a time which cannot at present be estimated. "In fact, we must prepare for the worst, while we hope for the best. We have adopted, in theory, the principle of national service. We must see that we put it into practice, because we want more men, and we want them now, and eventually we shall want all who can be spared."

ROUMANIANS AGAIN WIN OVER GERMANS IN TRANSYLVANIA

Bucharest, Oct. 4, via London.—The Rumanians have inflicted a further defeat on the Germans and Austrians in Transylvania, the war office announced today. The Teutonic forces were defeated in an engagement in the region of Pocaras. Austro-German attacks near Odokim were repulsed, and the Rumanians took more than 1,200 prisoners. The announcement follows: "On the northern and western fronts, in the Kallman and Ghurghul mountains, small engagements occurred. "In the region of Odokim there were engagements in which the enemy was repulsed. "Between Fogaras and Sighlacara our forces were again against German and Austrian troops, which were defeated."

MARRIAGE OF GRAND DUCHESS OLGA AND DUKE PETER DISSOLVED

London, Oct. 4.—Emperor Nicholas, according to a Reuters despatch from Petrograd today, has confirmed the dissolution, pronounced by the Holy Synod, of the marriage of his sister, the Grand Duchess Olga, to Duke Peter of Oldenburg. The Grand Duchess retains her imperial title, and is permitted to re-marry. Grand Duchess Olga was born on June 1, 1882. Her marriage to Peter Alexandrovich, Duke of Oldenburg, occurred on July 27, 1901.

Franz Josef Ill Again

London, Oct. 4.—A report reaching Vienna from Geneva, as forwarded to London by the Exchange Telegraph Company, says that Emperor Francis Joseph is confined to his bed with bronchitis, and that his condition is causing anxiety.

THE POLICE COURT.

Several remands were brought into court and sent back to jail. Flour Prices Soar. Flour prices again advanced yesterday, Manitoba being quoted at 30c. extra per barrel and Ontario 20c. These increases mean that the jobbing prices now for both grades are about as follows: Manitoba, \$10.15; Ontario, \$9.20.

SAMPLE OF HOW ZEPP RAIDS GERMAN PEOPLE ARE FOOLED FOR EFFECT ON GERMAN PEOPLE

Gen. Von Falkenhayn Issues Order to "Victors" of Rathenbug Pass Congratulating them on Brilliant Deeds.

London, Oct. 4.—"According to German newspapers," says a Reuters despatch from Amsterdam today, General Von Falkenhayn has issued to the "victors" of Rothenthurm Pass the following army order: "Express to all the troops which participated in the battle of Rothenthurm by sincere recognition of their brilliant deeds. A numerically superior enemy was as good as annihilated, and the remnants are still cowering about the mountains and will not escape their deserved fate. "The weak position, which fled to Rumania on hidden paths cannot longer be called troops. "May it so happen with all our enemies. Go forward to new deeds and new victories for all that is dear to us."

New Deputy War Minister. Berlin, Oct. 4, by wireless.—Lieut. General Von Schoelen has been appointed deputy minister of war, succeeding Lieut. General Von Wandel, who resigned recently because of poor health.

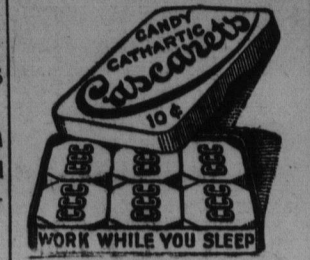
