U. S. LIEUT. SPENDS A MONTH ON BOARD GERMAN SUBMARINE

Was Made Prisoner When the Cargo Ship Ticonderoga Was Torpedoed on September 30 and Spent the Whole Month of October With the Huns Watching Them Sink Allied and Neutral Ships.

London, Nov. 25.—Lieut. Julius E. Fulcher, of Princeton, N. C., who with Lieut. Frank L. Muller, of Oakland, Calif., was taken on board the German submarine Deutschland and the torpedoed American cargo ship Ticonderoga, on Sept. 30, and was brought to Harwich yesterday by the U-boat, was wounded severely in the thigh when the Ticonderoga went down, according to the Harwich correspondent of the Daily Express. He accepted on a raft and was picked up by the U-boat. Muller was taken aboard by the same boat, but Fulcher did not learn of his presence until some days later.

CZECHO-SLOVAKS ANXIOUS TO GET BACK HOME

Those of Them Now in Russia Are Not at All Interested in That Country, But Wish to Return to Their Own Land.

Harbin, Saturday, Nov. 23.—The Czech-Slovak forces in Russia are not interested in the internal affairs in Russia and they desire to return to their homeland, but will remain in Russia because the Allied governments have requested them to do so, declares General Stefanik, minister of war in the Czech-Slovak government. The general was in Harbin today on his way to the Volga front.

MONTREAL POLICE CHIEF DISMISSED

Montreal, Nov. 25.—Municipal elections in Montreal have been thrown into a turmoil of excitement by the summary discharge today of Chief of Police, Narcisse Grandclamps. No explanation so far has been offered by the board of city commissioners for their action, but an enquiry will likely be demanded by Mr. Grandclamps. The ex-chief was appointed to office a few months ago, after the police department of the city had been reorganized following sensational charges against some of its officers.

ST. PETER'S Y.M.A.

A. boys overseas, and it is the intention of the society to give them a royal welcome home on their return.

NOBODY SORRY FOR AUSTRIA

Common People Are Glad the War is Over, But Have no Regret That Their Country is Being Broken up.

Vienna, Wednesday, Nov. 20.—The biggest fact apparent in Austria's breaking up of housekeeping is that there is no poignant regret among the common people. The sentiment generally found was expressed by a soldier the correspondent met among the rivers of men retreating from the Italian front. He said: "Now the war is over and we are brothers, whether French, British or Americans. Any kind of a brother is a good one."

STICKS CLOSE TO HIS FIRESIDE

Emperor Bill Has Not Left the Grounds of the Castle in Which He is Interned Since He Got There—Has the Village Parson to Dine With Him—Lots of Food for Him in Berlin.

Amsterdam, Nov. 25.—William Hohenzollern, the former German emperor, has not left the grounds of Amorbogen Castle since he was interned there, Dutch newspapers say. The former emperor begins each day with a walk about the castle grounds and then attends a religious service conducted by Count Von Bentinck or the count's son. The day closes with another walk in the gardens. The officers of his suite, however, dash about the country in automobiles.

NEW MAN SAYS HOLLAND WILL NEVER BECOME A REPUBLIC

Jacob Cremer, Minister to U. S., Declares Hundreds of Thousands of His People Are Strongly Pro-Ally and They Love Their Queen To Much to Plan Any Change of Government—Holland Needs Food.

New York, Nov. 25.—Jacob Theodore Cremer, newly appointed minister from the Netherlands to the United States, in a talk with newspaper men here today, just before his departure for Washington, where he goes to present his credentials, declared that millions of the common people of Holland had always been strongly pro-Ally. He added that Holland would never become a republic within the life of the present generation because of the love of the Dutch people for Queen Wilhelmina and the historic house of Orange. Mr. Cremer made light of reports of threatened revolution in Holland and attributed stories of the possible abdication of Queen Wilhelmina to Pieter Jelles Trochstra, "a pro-German Social Democratic member of the lower house, whose proposition," he said, "was turned down abruptly by the people and, probably never will be again brought up."

PASTY FACES, HOLLOW CHEEKS SUNKEN EYES MARK THE GERMANS

Conditions in Berlin Very Different from What They Used to be—Everybody is Free and Easy—Soldiers Do Not Bother Saluting Their Officers—People Accept Defeat Without Showing Much Interest One Way or the Other.

Berlin, via Copenhagen, Saturday, Nov. 23.—Strange are the experiences of a traveller who enters Germany after an absence of several years. Formerly there were many and varied governmental orders and restrictions to be obeyed. Nowadays when you go to a police station, the desk sergeant will say sadly, "You are not required to register any longer," and not even look at your passport.
