

Governor General Arrived Saturday

His Excellency and Party Left Yesterday on Empress of France — Inspected Boy Scout Guard — Presented Medal to A. C. Skelton.

The Duke of Devonshire and party arrived in the city by special train at 11.40 o'clock Saturday morning via the C. N. R. The train consisted of six cars, three coaches, two baggage and one for attendants. Superintendent Devost of the C. N. R. accompanied the party to St. John from Moncton. On arrival in the Union Depot His Excellency was met by Premier Foster, Major Hayes, Brigadier General Macdonnell, Col. Burrell, Major McMillan and Major Knox, Lieut. Governor Papey, on account of illness, was unable to be present to formally welcome the Governor General.

At the depot the special train was handed over to the C. P. R. and was taken around to Sand Point where the Governor General and party embarked on the steamship Empress of France which sailed yesterday afternoon at four o'clock for Liverpool. The Duke of Devonshire was accompanied by two daughters, Lady Rachel Cavendish and Lady Anne Cavendish.

Besides the members of the Governor's family there were in the viceregal party, Miss Alice Cavendish, Miss Saunders, Lady Evelyn Baillie Hamilton, Capt. D. E. Wallace, M. C., A. D. C., and Captain H. Macmillan, the Earl of Haddington, M. C., A. D. C.

The Duke of Devonshire is returning to England to attend the marriage of his daughter, Lady Dorothy Cavendish to Captain H. Macmillan, and expects to be away from Ottawa for about six weeks.

The Duchess of Devonshire and Lady Dorothy sailed from this port earlier in the season. On arrival at West St. John a large party of the Boy Scouts under command of Commissioner Richard Ingleson formed a guard of honor. They were drawn up in a horseshoe formation. His Excellency addressed the boys, speaking of the good work being conducted throughout Canada by the Boy Scout Association, and encouraged the lads to continue in this good work for the country.

After this brief address A. C. Skelton, Provincial Commissioner, was called forward and His Excellency presented to Mr. Skelton, the Honorary Silver Wolf medal in recognition of his services with the scouts. It is believed that there are only four other holders of this decoration in Canada.

DOMINION DAIRYING GROWS.

The season of 1919 established new records for Canadian dairying in several respects. The Dominion increased its total production of milk, and prices were higher than they have ever been before. In 1919 the average price paid for cream by the Dairy Producers' Commission was 23 1/2 cents f. o. b. steamships at Montreal.

Record prices were also paid for butter. The average price for all grades of creamery delivered at Montreal works out at a little over 53 1/2 cents. The quantity of creamery butter produced was the largest of any year in the history of the industry, the output showing an increase in every province except Manitoba, where the labor situation interfered with the shipping of cream and caused more butter to be made on farms.

Canadian cheese was handled, it has not yet been possible to secure exact figures of production or export for 1919. The receipts at Montreal were lower than in 1918, but a considerable quantity of cheese was exported to the United States through other ports, and the stocks on hand at country points are larger than they were at this time last year. The home consumption of cheese has, according to the best information obtainable, increased during the year.

The growth of the condensed milk and milk powder industries during the war period has been the most notable feature of Canadian dairy production.

CRUEL TREATMENT GIVEN CHRISTIANS BY RUMANIANS

Unitarians, Presbyterians and Catholics Implore Aid Against the Grave Crimes Being Committed.

Montreal, March 14.—A vivid account of the sufferings of the Protestant Christians of Transylvania at the hands of the Rumanians was given today at the Church of the Messiah by Rev. W. H. Drummond, of London, England, former editor of the Enquirer. Mr. Drummond spoke of his recent mission to the ancient Unitarian church of Transylvania, the Eastern province of the former Kingdom of Hungary. Shortly after the armistice, word had reached England of outrages and indignities heaped on the people by the Rumanians, and Mr. Drummond had been commissioned by the Unitarians of Great Britain and the United States to enquire into them. He had brought back messages from the Bishop of the Unitarian church there, the Bishop of the Reformed Presbyterian church and the Roman Catholic Bishop imploring aid against the grave crimes and personal outrages that had been committed. Pressures had been exercised and the Premier of Rumania had promised to protect religious freedom. He did not set much store by these promises, unless the full vigilance of the Unitarians and Presbyterians of the English-speaking world was exercised.
