Local Council of Women In Session

Spirited Discussion of Disposition of Five Hundred Dollar Grant Unexpended.

A spirited discussion of the disposition of the five hundred dollar grant received from the city for the entertainment of delegates to the National Council, occupied much time at yesterday's meeting of the local council held in the Board of Trade rooms. In the absence of the president, Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, Mrs. W. Edmund Raymond presided.

The Treasurer's Report
In the treasurer's report it was stated that receipts were \$2,866.87; expenditures \$2,018.50, leaving a balance on hand of \$848.37, including a check from Mayor Schofield of \$500, being the city grant. In the receipts are included sale of souvenir books, concert, luncheon and life membership fees. In expenditures are included board of delegates, printing of books, hire of hall and other items connected with the convention.

The \$500 Grant
Mrs. W. C. Good and several members, including Miss Travers, expressed the opinion that if the \$500 grant was not expended on the entertainment of visitors, it should be returned to the city. Miss Leavitt and others felt that expenses would have to be paid and as other conventions have been entertained by the city, so the city grant should be retained. After discussion, in which several members joined, moved by Mrs. Goldman, seconded by Mrs. Louis Green, it was decided that the money be left until the next meeting for settlement. Yesterday's attendance was not large, and the opinion of the meeting seemed to be that no action should be taken, although a number voted against returning the money to the city.

Comments
Miss McMillan, corresponding secretary, read a number of communications. One from the president, Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, regretted her absence from the meeting and asked for the interest of the council in furnishing a home at the new Nurses' Home. A letter was read from T. N. Burns, secretary of the St. John Board of Health, acknowledging receipt of the council's request that the position of Food Inspector, now held by Mrs. W. Edmund Flewelling, be made permanent, and promising consideration of this request. Thanks were received from H. St. Harris, district officer of the D. A. C. R. for space given the soldiers' exhibition of handicraft during the June convention.

Mrs. Thomas McCalley wrote expressing thanks for the life membership in the Local Council conferred upon her, and speaking in deeply appreciative words of the kindness received from St. John women. Mrs. Duddy expressed thanks for their sympathy. Mrs. Cameron, of Peterborough, wrote regarding attendance at National Council Executive and Mrs. Parsons also wrote regarding the same meeting. A letter of thanks for appreciation of the Boy Scouts' attendance at the council luncheon was received from A. C. Skelton, who appealed for further interest in the Scout Movement. Miss Millikan spoke of the brave actions of a boy scout in saving a life recently. Extracts from a letter from Mrs. Woodhall, of Calgary, were read.

Rosebud Day
Mrs. J. Willard Smith reported that she and Mrs. E. A. Young had interviewed the mayor regarding Rosebud Day, but that, in view of the fact that the Jewish organizations had postponed their tag day rather than interfere with the Red Cross appeal, Mayor Schofield wished the council to put off Rosebud Day, which is annually held for the benefit of the Children's Aid, until the New Year.

On motion a request received from the Daughters of Israel asking for a loan of boxes, was granted. A motion of regret at the departure from the city of Mrs. McCalley was passed. Mrs. W. Edmund Raymond, who has been recently in New York, described the story, telling as carried out in the Metropolitan Museum, and asked that the St. John Council would consider seriously taking up the work on a larger scale. Mr. Walter Golding had promised support, and it might be possible to have the hour held in the Imperial Theatre. Several members spoke in appreciation of the good effects of the story telling, being carried on in the Provincial Memorial Home at East St. John in the Free Kindergarten, and it is hoped to have an hour in the General Public Hospital. On motion the matter was left until the December meeting.
