IMPORTANT DISCOVERY.

The Government Fleeced to the Extent of \$50,000--Discoveries Made by the Northwest Town

Sites Commission--A Handsome Price for Lands.

Ottawa, Jan. 4--(Special)--J. A. Smart, deputy minister of interior, and E. Frederic Stephenson of Winipeg, crown timber agent of the dominion government, were app some time ago joint commissioners to audit all accounts and investigate and report upon all matters connected with the administra-

an matters connected with the administra-tion and sale by the trustees of lands com-prised in a number of town sites in the Canadian Northwest. The commissioners inquired into the town sites in Virden, Qu'Appelle, Regina and Moose Jaw. Their report has been prepared and submitted to the minister of the interior. It re-veals a rather startling state of affairs, and shows how the government was denvived and shows how the government was deprived of money which, the commissioners say, should have found its way to the public

To give a brief history of this it is neces-sary to go back to the spring of 1882. At that time the minister of the interior entered into an agreement with the C. P. R. W. B. Scarih, although he has been deputy minister of agriculture for some years, is still a trustee under the trust deed. The question of municipal taxation was one under discussion for a number of years between the trustees and the municipalities in which the town sites are situated. The position assumed up to 1890 by the trustees was that they were not taxable. The gov-ernment also took the position that the town sites avere not liable to taxation. A settlement was finally effected by which the trustees fould pay a rate of taxation equal to the interest of the Canada and Northwest inco an agreement with the C. P. R. whereby the dominion government and the company each would contribute an equal-arca of lend to constitute the above named town sites, which were to be laid out in town lots and sold, and an equal division made of the proceeds. The surveys were com-pleted that year, when the lots were offered for sale, first, under the management of the land commissioner of the C. P. R. at Winkings, and afterwards by trustees an-

This sum the commission-ers decided should be credited to the govern-ment account. W. B. Scarth also drew a salary of \$7,469 and E. B. Osler \$500 for ser-vices rendered. F. C. Campbell also got \$3,187 on salary. These amounts the com-missioners hold should be charged to the general expanse, account of the trustees, and credit therefore given to the govern-ment for one-half of the sum so paid. The balance to the credit of the government ac-count on 31st. December, 1899, was \$15,765, and if all the credits referred to are added this would make a total of \$46,855, which the government ought to be credited with. This was after it had been rented by the govern-ment for a number of years. The time the building was rented to the government 10 per cent. on an investment was considered a fair charge for rental in Regina, but in this case 16 per cent. was paid. This shows that an excessive rent was charged for the building, amounting to about \$6,000 or \$7,000. Admitting the investment to have been a proper one, says the report, the government should not have baid more as purchase money and in rentals than \$22,300 for the property, whereas' it was charged no less than \$33,45 for it, showing an excess of it to the trustees after deducting \$1,100 paid for fire insurance, of about \$10,000. The commissioners ulso report that the trustees made certain advances from trust moneys as follows: N. F. Davin, \$3,455; Judge Richardson, Regina, \$2,000, and South Qu'Appelle Building Society, \$300. With re-spect to the lean to Mr. Davin this money was paid in connection with a mortgage in 1882, given by Davin to Millar & Richard-son, type-founders, Toronto, for plant and material, purchased from them to establish a newspaper in Regina. 


