VISIT OF BRITISH CAPITALISTS TO A BUSY INDUSTRIAL CENTRE

London Financial News Tells of Trip of Manufacturers to Moncton—The Oil Wells, and the Accident Which Delayed One of the Party.

The following on Moncton, is from the London Financial News account of the trip to Canada by the British manufacturers from last summer. From Lewis the way for many miles along the bank of St. Lawrence and thence through the picturesque country of the St. Lawrence valley to the Miramichi river. Near Miramichi the railway passes from the province of Quebec into New Brunswick, a province hitherto much famed for its lumber and its furs, but now rapidly coming to the fore as an industrial and agricultural country. Several towns, such as Campbellton (where the time is advanced one hour), Bathurst, and Newcastle are passed en route.

Moncton is the headquarters of the Intercolonial (Canadian government) Railway and by its geographical and railway position is equipped to command much of the trade of the maritime provinces, as well as that of Central and Western Canada. In addition to the Intercolonial Railway works there are a number of other industries established in the city, such as the manufacture of stoves, cottons, clothes, yarns, fencibles, etc. In the immediate vicinity of Moncton lies the great natural gas and oil field of New Brunswick. From the twenty odd wells that have recently been bored, there is an output of 40,000,000 cubic feet of high-class natural gas per day. This is already being piped into Moncton city for the purposes of light, heat, and power, and is estimated to be having a great stimulating effect upon the local industry. The introduction of this cheap power, Moncton possesses the most complete facilities for the maritime provinces. Now, with the great bon of cheap power added, nothing can prevent the rise of this city to a great industrial centre.

On reaching the oil fields the party halted at one of the company's houses, where they were shown the natural gas and oil wells, and the drilling machinery in operation. Subsequently an inspection of the oil tanks was made, where every thing appeared to be in the best order. The quality, etc., was fully explained by Mr. O. P. Boggs and Dr. Henderson. From there the visitors went to Hillsboro and returned to the Moncton Hotel. Mrs. C. J. Osmen, an excellent repeat had been prepared. The house and other buildings were gaily decorated for the occasion. Great credit must be given Mr. and Mrs. Osmen for the kindly and hospitable welcome extended to all, and for their extreme courtesy in throwing open their private homes to the visitors.

The party returned to Moncton, arriving in the city between 8 and 8.30 o'clock. On their arrival here they were taken to the electric light station, where they were shown natural gas in use under the boilers, after which they were driven about the city, and also viewed the gas analysis station and at Bend View Square. The party then repaired to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Lodge, the apartments of which were also beautifully furnished with natural gas. A large marquee had been erected, and a number of citizens were present to extend a welcome to the visitors. After supper had been served his excellency the mayor, in a few brief remarks, extended to the visitors on behalf of the citizens a cordial welcome.

The Lieut.-Governor. He then introduced His Honor Lieut.-Governor Wood, who referred to the vast amount of knowledge that sometimes existed in regard to the resources of Canada and the possibilities that it afforded for business enterprise, but he was sure that the visit of such a party would result in making Canada and its riches better known to the British public. The Lieut.-Governor specially thanked Mr. Palmer for what he had done towards making Canada better known to the mother country, and congratulated The Financial News on its enterprise in the present undertaking.

Mr. R. W. Hewson, K. C., was then introduced as the principal speaker of the evening, and on behalf of the committee he had great pleasure in welcoming the splendid delegation representing the great commercial and industrial interests of Great Britain to the maritime provinces, and particularly to Moncton, named after a famous British general, who in 1758, after a long and arduous campaign, had defeated the Duke of Cumberland. Mr. Hewson mentioned the time he had spent with the French people, who were here before us, with the greatest harmony, people delightful of intercourse and charm of manner, who have proved themselves British subjects, enjoying the freedom and liberties of the British constitution.
