been ordered to return to the treasury  
of his company \$750,000 worth of stock  
and \$60,000 in dividends. It was  
charged that an attempt had been  
made to freeze the treasury of the  
company by the big find of oil in Mossa town-  
ship.

one. A good idea; why not proclaim  
a general Arbor Day.

to the purchaser. There have been

men and wearing returned men's but-  
tons who were never out of the coun-  
try, and in some cases never in uni-  
form. Ask them for their papers.

A meeting consisting of committees  
from the three churches in the town  
was held in the school room of the  
Anglican church on last Sunday night,  
looking to a public thanksgiving ser-  
vice being held on the signing of the  
peace terms. It was planned to hold  
a union service in the town hall on  
Sunday evening following the  
signing of the peace terms, service to  
begin at 7:30, the churches to be asked  
to withdraw their usual evening ser-  
vice for that occasion. An offering  
will be taken at the meeting to go to  
the Soldiers' Aid Commission. It is  
not yet known when the peace docu-  
ment will be signed, but all are asked  
to hold themselves in readiness for the  
thanksgiving service.
