## ONLY ONE DEER MAY THIS YEAR BE SHOT

SEASON CHANGED TO OPEN NOV. 5th, BUT DOESN'T END TILL NOV. 30th NO PARTRIDGE SHOOTING THIS YEAR.

Despite the fact that Mr. H. C. O'Living is still with us, the Ontario Government has decided that this year the deer hunters will have to go back to the old rule of one hunter one deer. Last year, as a "war measure" and to ensure the public a little meat

in Ontario, the law was changed to allow two deer per hunter. There have been reports that there was a large slaughter of deer last year, but many an old hunter will tell you that last year was the first of many that he didn't get his count, and many didn't even get one deer. This was accounted for because the wolves were bad in the northern hunting grounds of Ontario, and the deer were chased down to southern portions of the hunter's paradise. Those who hunted there got their count as a rule. **DATE IS CHANGED.** Another change that has been made

this year is that deer hunting does not start until November 5th, instead of November 1st. Many hunters are rather opposed to this, but the majority are satisfied. They can have their fifteen days' shooting just the same, as the season does not close till November 30th.

The season for moose, reindeer and caribou, south of the C. P. R. is set for the same dates—November 5th to 20th—but north of the C. P. line shooting has already begun for the first day was October 1st and the last day is November 30th. Again only one of these can be taken, but no cow moose, young moose, reindeer or caribou under one year of age may be shot.

**NO PARTRIDGE THIS YEAR.** Partridge hunters must wait another year before they can shoot this game as there is no open season this year, but ducks, squirrels, rabbits and hares are ready for the hunter's trusty shotgun. Wild turkeys may be shot, that is to say, if any can be found in Ontario, but the Telegram is reliably informed that a real wild turkey is almost as scarce in Ontario now as hant's teeth. It may be well to state that the Government has fixed the hours for shooting game, and hunters are forbidden to use their rifles between sunset and sunrise.

Every hunter whether a resident in Ontario or not, must take out a license before he can go after deer. Non-resident licenses for deer and moose are \$25, while resident licenses are \$3 for deer and \$5 for moose.

## WOULD DELAY THE ACQUISITION G.T.R.

LIBERALS TO HOLD CAUCUS ON MATTER TO-DAY RESOLUTION TO BE DEBATED IN HOUSE TO-MORROW.

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—The Liberals will hold a caucus on Tuesday morning to consider the attitude of the party in the House in connection with the legislation covering the proposed acquisition of the Grand Trunk Railway system.

Individual Opposition members tonight expressed the view that after bringing down all the information available and a general discussion of the merits of the railway proposal in the House the Government should allow Parliament to defer final action until the regular session, which should be called before the end of January or early in February. They claim that the Government early in the week intimated that the session was practically over and that legislation of such great importance should not be introduced through this session more particularly as Sir Alfred Smithers must secure the consent of the Grand Trunk board of directors.

**DISCUSSION TO-MORROW.** The resolution made public on Friday will appear on the order paper to-morrow for the first time and under the rules of the House it is hardly possible that it can be proceeded with before Wednesday, as it is customary to give formal notice of the date on which discussion is to be commenced. It is regarded as unlikely that the Government will listen to any suggestion that final action should be deferred until next session and the Grand Trunk bill will be passed through both Houses before prorogation.

Riga is being bombarded by the enemy. The communication follows: "For five days the Lettish troops before Riga have been engaged in eating off incessant stubborn German attacks.

"The Germans are bombarding the unfortified town of Riga. Cruisers belonging to the allied powers are participating on the defense. "The Germans repeatedly have been repulsed in attempts to force the Duna River."
