In fencing and riding, the Prince's want of familiarity with the English language, and his absence from the Academy on the occasion of the death of the Emperor, his progress and ability were declared highly creditable. General Simmons, governor of the Academy, told the Empress that if the Prince had, had the same advantages as the other cadets be would undefibledly have been first on the lists.

It is nothing to be surprised at that the Emperor Wilhelm should prohibit the proposed purchase of ten thousand horses in Germany for the French army; but the motive of the French Government, in make the proposed purchase of attention when ing public its intention of attempting what everybody might have known beforehand would not be allowed, is not so easy to fathom. Should the truth of the story be confirmed by later advices, it will go far to deepen the impression that France and Germany are alike seeking a renewal of the war. That both are vigorously preparing for it is no secret.

The rebuilding of Warwick Castle is now complete, at an expense of between £15,000 and £20,000. In restoring the eastern wing, which was destroyed by fire, care has been taken to carry out as far as possible the original design.
