

both before any of the Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or of the Provincial or Circuit Courts, transmitted to the office of the Civil Secretary of the Province, to have and receive by warrant under the hand and seal of the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or person administering the government of this Province for the time being, directed to the Receiver-General of this Province, the sum of two hundred Pounds, currency, out of such unappropriated moneys as he may have in his hands, to be applied to the maintenance and support of such school and School-house.

IV. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that in order to support and maintain the Schools that may, at any time hereafter, be opened and established under this Act, the said Corporations, until they shall have respectively acquired property yielding the annual revenue of one hundred Pounds, currency, shall be entitled to have and receive for the purposes of this Act, from and out of the yearly revenues of the respective Churches or Fabriques in the several Parishes in which the said Schools may be opened and established, by virtue of and under the present Act, a sum of money which shall not in any case exceed the fourth part of the annual revenues of such Churches or Fabriques.

V. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the said Corporations shall annually account in writing, after the third Sunday next after Easter, at an assembly of the inhabitants of the Parish, and a copy of the said Report containing a statement of the revenues and expenditure of the Corporation for the last twelve months, and of the number of Scholars, and of the name of the School-master shall be filed within one month in the office of the Prothonotaries of the Court of King's Bench of the District, to which all persons, being inhabitants of this Province, shall have free access without paying any fee.

VI. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that all the Schools established under this Act shall be equally open to all children, being subjects of His Majesty, and that the price of instruction for each child shall not exceed the sum of which sum shall exclusively belong to, and be paid the School-master, for his own proper benefit.

VII. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that this Act shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Act, and as such shall receive that construction which shall be the most favorable for the promotion of Education.
