It has been suggested that because the University Bookstore orders texts in greater quantities than would be ordered by a teacher, the discount is greater. This is not so — the discount is covered and now, on all items the same irrespective of quantity where it is possible without jeopand this discount is allowed only to authorized textbook outlets.

In a small one-classroom operation, book requirements may be on to the students. ordered by a teacher who then sells them to the students. The time involved in ordering and handling these books is presumably subscribed free by the teacher. However, the books can under these circumstances be sold at invoice price only if the school absorbs the transportation costs.
