Dear Mr. Anderson:

I have just returned from England, and find your letter of June 28.

I regret that at the moment I do not know of any possible openings which I could advise your looking into, but I shall be glad indeed to remember your desire to secure a wider field of service than the one in which you are at present; and in the event of learning of possible openings, I shall be glad to communicate with you and to mention your name from time to time in quarters where I think some mention may be of use.

I am wondering whether it might not be well for you to take up anew your correspondence with the Great Western Sugar Company. It is some months since I myself have had correspondence with any officers of the Company, and I am therefore not in a position to know how the developments which were planned some months ago have progressed. With the Company's control of sixteen or more factories, and its relations with the farming as well as the manufacturing interests, it is just possible that there may still be an opening which would afford you the kind of opportunity you are seeking. The fact that the Company had already made overtures to you would make it wholly natural for you to resume the correspondence you had had with them.

I regret that it is not possible for me to make any other suggestion at the moment. I should be only too glad to keep your wishes in mind.
