Dear Mr. Perry:-

I am just in receipt of a communication from Mr. R.H. Moore, of Vanderhoof, B.C., in which he informs me that the last time he was in Prince George, he went into Mr. Vandyk's office to see about traplines for the Indians of the Stikine. He informs me that Mr. Vandyk was away, and that the stenographer told him that everything was just about completed. In fact that there were only ten more to do, and that she thought that these ten would be ready to send forward to Mr. Harper Reed for his signature in about a week.

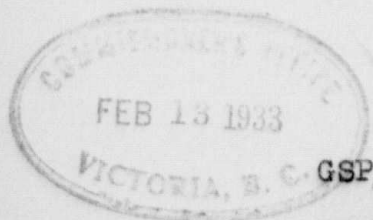
The stenographer informed him that as far as their office was concerned that everything was satisfactory, but of course, they could not tell definitely until they received the applications duly returned and signed by Mr. Reed. She also told Mr. Moore that it was found necessary to register the Indians individually rather than as a band. This, of course, would mean much more work for the Game Warden's office, and consequent delay.
