### A LITTLE WRONG FOR A BIG RIGHT

The police had little trouble in discovering the masked raiders who demolished the interior furnishings of the house on Lorin avenue Wednesday night. P. C. Groves worked on the case yesterday and last night 15 men and boys from the neighborhood were arraigned at the police court to answer a charge of housebreaking. The ages of the party ranged from 15 to 42 years. The marauders had been playing football and when it became too dark to continue the game they decided to do a little scavenger work in the neighborhood. The house of alleged easy virtue had only been occupied for about three weeks but the complaints against it were many. The neighbors say that no respectable woman could pass the place without being made, it is alleged, the subject of coarse remarks. It is further claimed that young men were called in off the street. The residents in the vicinity assert that the character of the house and the unseemly conduct witnessed there had been reported to the police. The police, however, deny this and say that the house had never been reported to them. They are sorry that the neighbors didn't call their attention to it as the raid might have been avoided.

Public sympathy is altogether with the young man who by their hasty action have brought themselves within the pale of the law. The offense charged is a serious one and the severest penalty allowed by the law is life imprisonment. Public opinion is with the raiders and, while many express regret that the boys should have acted so hastily, still citizens generally are unanimous in expressing the hope that the court will deal as leniently as possible with the young men. Some citizens go farther and say that the public good resulting from a criminal action should be recognized.

After being arraigned last night the party were released on bail readily furnished by the neighbors and then adjourned till next Friday owing to the absence from the city of Crown Attorney Herbert D. Smith. O. L. Lewis was present in court to-day as counsel for the defendants.

### IN THE LEGISLATURE.

The Government's Attitude to Timber Resources.

Toronto, May 1.—The first of the expected discussions on motions to go into Committee of Supply arose in the Legislature yesterday, when Mr. St. John made a lengthy criticism of the timber policy of the Government. He declared the department was ignorant of the resources, accepted its information respecting the territory beyond the height of land from Indians, and said the timber was not protected from fire. Hon. Mr. Davis showed that Mr. St. John had totally ignored the extensive report of the exploration parties of 1900, which had revealed much valuable information, that the Government had made provision for fire-rangers beyond the height of land, and that the conditions for reforesting were not nearly so favorable here as in a country where the whole of the tree was marketable and at a higher price. During this address Mr. St. John made an admission that the fire-rangering on the licensed land was satisfactory. Mr. St. John had indulged in criticism of the agricultural value of new Ontario lands, and this drew a reply from Mr. Milton Carr. No division was taken, many of the Opposition members, including Mr. Gage, being absent.

### LAST NIGHT'S FROST

The severe frost last night did considerable damage to the fruit trees and early garden stuff. It is feared that the peach and plum crops have been ruined. The greatest damage is believed to have been done to the peach trees. The brickyard owners also suffered quite a loss. The frost destroyed a good many fresh-moulded bricks in the yards of Messrs. Cornhill, Fielder and Jordan. There was about five degrees of frost last night, and ice quite thick was formed.
