Take courage, then, though you may not be known as a splendid church goer. Remember, a good deal of necessary growing goes on under the surface before a plant gives any outward sign of life, and any rash interference with this secret, hidden growth might stop it altogether. If God, in answer to your eager, unwise prayer, let the full light in too soon on a weak soul, you might have good reason to repent your impatience and to wish that you had been willing to trust Him more. If you sow good seed and water it with prayer, He will, in due time, give the increase. "Take heed, and be quiet; fear not, neither be faint-hearted."

The platter high with fish?

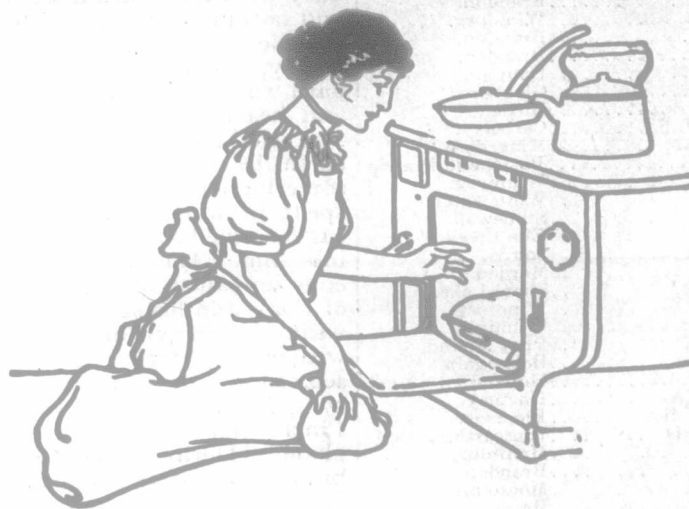
Is it to fast an hour,
