URING the week under review there was no decisive event of the war to record, and the relative positions of the contending Powers underwent but little change. On the whole, the week seems to have resulted in a slight general ad vantage to the Allies.

In the western arena many attacks and counter attacks were delivered throughou the whole line from the Vosges to the sea. The fiercest fighting took place to the north of Arras, in which the Allies were, for the most part, successful; but in the immediate vicinity of Souchez (around which so many bloody contests have been waged) the Germans, at the close of the week, succeeded, by a drive in force and by the use of asphyxiating gases, in taking possession of the cemetery. LAST FRIDAY'S STORM

Early last Friday morning began one of the most violent storms ever known in this Province at this season of the year. The wind continued to rage with great

violence throughout the day, and in the early morning was accompanied by a deluge of rain. St. Andrews suffered considerably, the sewers being of too small size to cope with the immense quantity of surface water so suddenly injected, and in consequence the water overflowed the streets and flooded a number of cellars in the low-lying parts of the Town. 
