The Committee had been at work for several years, and their report would be of widespread interest. It would not be necessary for the General Synod to receive the assent of the Archbishop of Canterbury to any changes to make them valid, as the General Synod of the Church of England in Canada had full power to revise the Prayer Book; but the changes passed in the Lower House must be ratified by the Upper House, composed of the Metropolitan of Canada and the other Bishops.
