"ANGELS AND SOUP"

Rescuing Belgian School Children From Starvation

"The soup, the soup!" this is the whisper that spreads from child to child in the rooms of a large school in Brussels, at about eleven every morning, for all the children look forward to their soup, just as Canadian school-children look forward to their play-time. These Belgian children have heard the big cans of hot soup being taken from a wagon in the street. They know their food is coming, and their hunger will soon be satisfied.

That is why their whisper of "the soup, the soup," becomes louder than a murmur and the teacher is compelled to say "Quiet, children! A few moments pass, and then comes the order "Attention—stand—march!" The children rise from their seats, and file out of the room; just as they have been taught in case of fire, only instead of marching out of the building they enter a large hall. There, other children, both boys and girls, from other school-rooms, come filing in to take their seats at long, low tables. They make a good deal of noise, for most of them have on heavy wooden sabots, instead of boots, like the children of Holland, but when the head-teacher again cries "Attention!" they are all seated quietly in their places.

Then Belgian women, all in white dresses, pour soup—good thick soup—into bowls which are on the table, one in front of each child. It is the way of the world that the poor are usually the servants of the rich, but here in Belgium, those who once were rich and will always be ladies, are now proud and glad to be known as the servants of the poor. They are styled in Belgium "les Servantes des Faveurs," but the children upon whom they wait affectionately call them "Les Anges"—The Angels.

The serving of soup throughout the schools of Belgium is only one feature of the work of the Relief Commission, who are to-day feeding the entire population of Belgium. Funds are urgently needed, and must be forthcoming, if the work is to continue.
