AGAIN ADRIFT IN BAY OF FUNDY. | BRITISH TROOUS HOLD

Monday, Aug 13. Scarcely a week since James Knight, a Newfoundland fisherman, had been lost in the bay for four days and fad mights in an open boat and had put into St. John for refuge, he has been again at the mercy of the elements. This time he was in the company of James Simms, and in Thursday's gale was blown away from the schoorer he was fishing from, in a small boat. For forty hours the two were without food or drink until they came to shore Sat-urday morning.


