Test Your Grain

The simplest method of testing seed
corn is this: Take a shallow dish or
pan; into this lay one or two thick-
nesses of flannel or blotting paper,
then count out 100 grains of corn,
cover with two or three thicknesses of
the same flannel, and keep moist with
warm water, not too moist. Set this
in a warm room or back of the kitchen
stove. At the end of three days ex-
amine, and at the end of five or six
days make a final examination, count
out the number of dead or non-vital
grains and you then have the percent-
age that will grow.

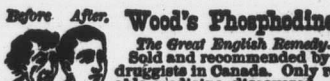
