TO PAY COMMONERS

Premier Campbell-Bannerman Says Government is Considering the Question and Quotes Commoner Figures.

London, Feb. 28.—(C. A. P.)—Answering a question in the House yesterday the Premier said the Government was considering the question of the payment of members. He pointed out that existing practice in colonies was, in Canada, when the session was more than 30 days \$2,500; session 30 days or less, \$20 for each day's attendance; Australia, \$400 pounds a year; New Zealand, £200; South Australia, £200; Queensland, £300; New South Wales, £300; Victoria, £300; Cape of Good Hope, members resident within 15 miles from the House a guinea each day for attendance, more than 15 miles, a guinea remuneration and 15 shillings allowance for personal expenses for every day's absence from home on parliamentary duties; Natal, £1 daily travelling allowance for members who reside three miles or more from the place of assembly; Newfoundland, payments voted annually, the public service act of 1905 making provision for \$8,300 in salaries for 36 members.

BANWELL WAS BROUGHT BACK

Captured at Kingston, Jamaica With His Wife and Money

HE WILL PLEAD GUILTY

Halifax, Feb. 28.—Exactly 80 days after Edwin St. George Banwell bade good-bye to Canada, as he no doubt hoped for the last time, he landed back again on Dominion soil in custody of Detective Black of the Toronto detective department. Banwell is credited with having been clever and smooth enough to take away some \$40,000 from the financiers who control the Crown Bank. When he left Toronto there went with him Norah Hector, who is now Mrs. Banwell.

As soon as possible Deputy Chief Stark of Toronto boarded the ship and took charge of affairs as far as Banwell and his wife were concerned. Mr. Stark had thoughtfully arranged before hand that the young couple remain in their stateroom until it was time for them to leave for the 4 o'clock L. C. R. train. From the boat they were driven to the depot in a closed carriage. The couple are looking well, although if he ever had any color in his face he has lost most of it. She was looking bright and cheerful. In the cabin he was busy turning over the leaves of a book, but Mrs. Banwell gazed around with rather an amused expression at the customs officers, as if she wondered what the men in the uniform and buttons meant by asking their destination and business. She seemed to think they should have known. They don't seem to realize their position.

Will Plead Guilty.

Banwell admits taking the money, and will plead guilty. He is in hopes of getting a light sentence.

It was on Dec. 9 he saw his opportunity, and he says he could not let it get by him. He had had a vase, he says, he could have filled it, but having no value he simply filled his pockets. When leaving the bank with his pockets stuffed full of money he met and passed the accountant. He went over to McConkey's and met Miss Hector by appointment. He told her he was now in a position to pay his bills and would get out of the city. She replied, "If you are going, I am going with you." After lunching at McConkey's they strolled up Yonge street, and went into Ryrie Bros., where Banwell purchased \$3,500 worth of jewelry, consisting of a large single stone diamond ring, valued at \$700, four ladies' 3-stone diamond rings, and one diamond brooch, and a diamond brooch and ring, which Detective Black recovered from Mrs. Banwell three days before they left Kingston.

Married at Buffalo.

They left on the 5 p. m. train for Buffalo, where they were married, then evening. From there they went to New York. Their flying trip from New York to Santiago, and from there to Kingston, has already been told. The principal means of reaching them was by the little black valise which Mrs. Banwell always insisted on carrying, and which contained the money and jewelry.

The First Clue.

The real clue, and the one that led to the arrest, was found at the Passage Hotel, Havana, where a signature on the register attracted the attention of Mr. O'Grady, Jr., who had been accompanying the detectives. Detective Dubane later at Kingston, Jamaica, accosted Banwell by saying: "Hello, Ban."

"I don't know you," was the reply. "Yes, you do, I am a Pinkerton detective; the jig is up; we want that money." The officers went to Banwell's room and got it.

Banwell was arrested, and while in charge of the local police at Kingston his meals were furnished by Detective Black. Mrs. Banwell has been stopping at the Myrtle Bank Hotel, her bill having been paid at the rate of \$3 per day by Detective Black. After the necessary legal proceedings had been completed with they left Kingston for Canada. The trip over was uneventful. Banwell and his wife were in good humor and cheerful.

Why He Did It.

Banwell gave as one reason for committing the robbery, that he was sore at O'Grady and thought that he had not received the promotion he thought was his, according to Capt. Hoel-sland of the star.

Detective Black brought back with him \$20,000 in unsigned bills, \$7,000 in checks, 6,000 in twenties, currency amounting to \$1,500, diamonds \$4,000, money sent home \$1,000, and \$1,500 spent by Banwell, making a total of \$41,000.

Mrs. Banwell will, according to present intention, be locked up when the party arrives in Toronto Thursday morning.

Valencia Disaster Report.

Victoria, Feb. 28.—An interim report has been presented to Hon. Wm. Tennant by the commissioners investigating the Valencia disaster, declaring the available evidence insufficient to prove whether the calamity was due to inadequate lighting of the coast. The commission urges several recommendations re. lights and fog alarms.

As Hated For His Past.

New York, Feb. 28.—Jos. Jordan, arrested for perjury in the Rice appeal case, because he swore he had never served a prison term many years ago, declared yesterday he had lied only because he was ashamed to acknowledge the disgrace. Judge Olcott said he believed the explanation.

Operators Call Conference.

Pittsburg, Feb. 28.—Francis L. Robbins, leader of the bituminous operators, has called a conference in this city to-day of the operators' committee to consider the question of holding another conference with the miners in an endeavor to prevent a strike.

MAY PREVENT RUPTURE

Russian Influence May be Effective With Germany

FRANCE CANNOT YIELD

St. Petersburg, Feb. 28.—Russia is using all her influence at Berlin to prevent a rupture between France and Germany. Her action has been taken at the instance of Paris, where the Rouvier Government is apparently convinced that Germany proposes to persist in her attitude even to the point of provoking war.

On account of the close relations existing between the courts of Berlin and St. Petersburg, it is believed in France that Russia will have more influence upon Emperor William than any other power.

Algerias, Feb. 28.—The French officials who are attending the Moroccan conference do not look favorably upon the Berlin report that Germany will make concessions if France will also yield something. The French say it will be long enough for Germany to ask for further French concessions when Germany has responded to those already made. Until this is done the indications are that France will not move.

Sidi Mohammed El Mokhi, the second Moroccan delegate, has caused considerable excitement by the disclosure that concessions for harbor improvements at Casablanca and Safi, two leading Atlantic ports of Morocco, were given to the Crucet Co. (French) at the same time that the Germans secured a concession for harbor improvements at Tangier.
