LIBRARY BOARD

A Short Meeting Held Last Evening at Which Routine Business Was Transacted

The regular monthly meeting of the Public Library Board was held last evening. Routine business only was transacted.

There were present Chairman J. W. Humphrey and Messrs. Sheldrick, Anderson, Thibodeau, Twohey, Charteris and Smith.

A communication was received from the Alice in Wonderland Company, offering to put on an entertainment in aid of the Library—Received.

The Living Age Company, Boston, solicited a subscription, which was referred to Book Committee.

Two accounts were received from the Leonard Scott Publishing Company. Referred to secretary to clear the matter up with G. W. Salzman, through whom the publications are ordered.

An account from the Library Bureau Co. of 56c, was passed.
Mr. Sheldrick reported receiving a request from a local photographer to take some pictures of the interior of the Library.—Granted.

It was decided to approve of the action of the Room Committee in granting the School Board the use of the auditorium at the usual rate.

Dr. Charteris, for the Finance committee, reported \$100 in the treasury, and when the month's cheque is drawn there will be \$223 in the treasury with a number of accounts to be paid, which will reduce this amount somewhat.

Mr. Sheldrick, for the special committee, reported the repairing of the roof, reported that Messrs. Robertson & McKie had been given the contract for \$125, they to guarantee the job providing the snow is kept off the roof. The work has been completed. When they were doing the work they found one of the conductor pipes had burst. They had a specially strong pipe made to take the place of the destroyed one, and the roof is now in good condition. Mr. Sheldrick thought the contract price a reasonable one.

Dr. Charteris was appointed to meet the Macaulay Club in reference to rental for the use of the Library, auditorium.

Dr. Charteris brought up the matter of what charge should be made against the School Board for the use of the auditorium. He had asked some of the trustees to be present at this meeting, but none were present. He thought the Library Board should get \$5 a week for the use of the auditorium.

Mr. Sheldrick—Five dollars seems to me to be a reasonable fee.

Mr. Humphrey—I think they should pay that amount.

Mr. Sheldrick—According to the report of the School Board meeting in the Planet Mr. Humphrey seems to have offered it for nothing.

Mr. Humphrey—No such words passed between Mr. Robertson and Robertson and myself.

Mr. Sheldrick—Then you have a case against The Planet.

Mr. Humphrey—Oh, there is no use trying to get ahead of The Planet.

It was decided to charge the School Board \$5 a week during the time they use the auditorium.

The salaries were ordered paid.

It was decided to draw an order on the city treasurer for \$113.55.

The Board then adjourned.

MAY ABANDON WEI HAI WEI

Anglo-Japanese Treaty Will Be Communicated to the Powers.

London, Sept. 7.—The Anglo-Japanese treaty signed August 12 is not yet ready for promulgation, some formalities in printing, etc., having to be carried out.

At the Foreign Office yesterday it was said that the treaty will be ready early next week, but before publication, it will be communicated to the powers. Although the powers interested are not in possession of the terms of the treaty, their representatives in London express themselves satisfied, and it is generally understood that the treaty does not interfere in any way with existing rights.

While Wei Hai Wei may not be mentioned in the treaty, it is believed that Great Britain is likely to evacuate that port. However, with the understanding that the treaty does not interfere with existing conditions in the Far East, the chief interest in Great Britain is as to what its effect would be on India.

Upsets Balance of Power.
St. Petersburg, Sept. 7.—There is much comment in the morning papers on the Anglo-Japanese treaty, which it is claimed, is not conducive to peace, because it upsets the balance of power in the Far East and makes Great Britain and Japan predominant.

The Novo Vremya expresses the opinion that it is directed against German designs in the Far East, while The Svet declares the treaty shuts out Russia from the Pacific and the open sea anywhere in Asia. The Bourse Gazette takes a similar view.

\$4,000 Rings and Pins Stolen.

Toronto, Sept. 7.—As the result of some fast work on the part of shop-lifters yesterday Ryrie Bros. reported \$4,000 in rings and stick pins as missing. The method of operation is a mystery. The time of the robbery has been placed at between 4 and 6 o'clock in the afternoon. The theft was discovered at 6 o'clock, when the store staff commenced to lock the vaults up in the vault. It was then seen that 18 rings and about 75 stick pins, were gone, which ranged in value from \$75 to \$650.
