ON TRIAL BUT NOT PRESENT AT COURT

Unusual Procedure in Relation to Charges Against Potato Shippers - Star Chamber Methods Condemned.

It is said, and it seems that there is considerable truth in it, that the potato shippers are to be tried without being allowed to be present at their trial or to be represented by counsel. It is understood that Mr. Hereford, the investigator, has intimated his intention to examine any witness alone excluding everybody except the Commissioner and his counsel, Mr. P. J. Hughes, K. C., and that this examination will take place at any time or at any place without notice to any of the parties whose conduct has been brought into question. It is understood that the investigator was willing to have Mr. T. W. Caldwell, M. P., present when the witnesses were to be examined as he was the man who had been named by the complainants to represent them, but he would not allow Mr. Caldwell to be present if the shippers objected.

It is also understood that Mr. Hereford, after examining any witness that he chooses to call in that way privately intends to take a run up to Harland, Perth and Bath, and go into the offices of Hatfield & Co., Ltd., C. E. Gallagher and Co., and Guy G. Porter Co., Ltd., and obtain any information that there may be there in the way of correspondence or contracts or books, etc. After that he may call some of the gentlemen representing these various firms separately to give evidence before him and that he and his counsel may cross-examine them privately.

The intention seems to be to prevent any of this information being given to the public.

Mr. H. H. Hatfield, one of the shippers in question expressed himself very strongly against any such Star Chamber methods of investigation into any question where charges had been made against any present against whom the charges were made to be present and to take part in the proceedings.

It is understood that all these shippers are perfectly willing to have Mr. Hereford or anybody else who has authority from the Government to go into their offices and examine anything they have in the office or obtain any information in reference to this matter but their objection is that people will be called in to give any evidence they choose to give privately and that the persons accused should be excluded from the room and not have an opportunity to hear what they have to say and they also object to the fact that the names of those people who have caused all this trouble and publicity are not being divulged.

Since the above was written the investigation is going on as indicated. In view of the wide publicity that was given the charges made against the potato shippers the methods of investigation would seem open to some criticism.—The Carleton Sentinel.

Watched by Almost All - Nearly Total Darkness prevailed and the Phenomena was a very Interesting One.

Almost total suspension of all activities was the order of the day in Hartland between the hours of 9 and 10.30 a. m. on Saturday. People could be seen everywhere running around with smoked glass before their eyes, anxiously peering heavenward. About 9.20, watchers observed the shadow on the face of the sun and this gradually increased until very little of "Old Sol" was visible. YEAR'S WORK OF NURSING CLASS

Home Nursing Class Under Auspices of Red Cross Hear Most Interesting and Beneficial Series of Lectures.

The Home Nursing Class which was organized in Hartland closes this year's series of lectures on February 2nd. Throughout the fall and winter the class met on Monday night at the Armory and there listened to interesting lectures by various parties. The majority of the trained nurses in town, together with Dr. MacIntosh and Dr. Chestnut, had charge. The total enrollment was 55 with an average attendance of 33 which is very creditable.

The original program contained 12 lectures on subjects that would be likely to be most useful around the home. Two extra lectures were given. A large amount of literature dealing with tuberculosis was distributed. This literature was obtained from Dr. Ferris of St. John and was distributed through the community in order to place, before the people is a readable form information concerning this menace to civilization.

Last Monday night was scheduled for the last meeting of the program and the attendance was large. A most enjoyable time was spent and refreshments were served.

The Red Cross Society is to be commended for their energetic work in forming this class, for it comes under the work of the Red Cross Society and the people of the town will, no doubt, greatly benefit from instruction delivered at the Nursing Class during the past series of lectures.
