Municipal Elections

Public Notice is hereby given to the electors of the North Ward of the Municipality of Nanaimo, that I require the presence of said electors at the City Police Court House on the 4th day of May, 1915, from 12 noon to 2 p.m. for the purpose of electing one person to represent them in the municipal council.

The mode of nomination of candidates shall be as follows:

The candidates shall be nominated in writing; the writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposer and seconder and shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of the notice and 2 p.m. of the day of nomination, and in the event of a poll being necessary such poll will be opened on the 7th day of May, 1915, at the City Police Court House from 9 o'clock a.m. to 7 o'clock p.m. of which every person is hereby required to take notice and govern himself accordingly.

The persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as an Alderman of the City of Nanaimo, shall be such persons as are male British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years, and are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination the registered owner in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City of Nanaimo of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment Roll of five hundred dollars or more, over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who are otherwise duly qualified as municipal voters.

OF CANADIANS.

was followed by two enemy assaults. Although the fumes were extremely powerful, they were not perhaps, having regard to the wind, so disabling as on the French lines, which ran almost east to west, and the brigade affected by the fumes, stoutly beat back the two German assaults.

"Encouraged by the result it rose to the supreme effort required by the assault on the wood, which has already been described. At 4 a.m. on the morning of Friday the 23rd, a fresh emission of gas was made both upon the 2nd brigade, which held the line running northeast, and upon the third brigade, which, as has been fully explained, continued the line up to the pivot point as defined above, and had spread down in a southeasterly direction. It is perhaps worth mentioning that two privates of the 48th Highlanders who found their way into the trenches commanded by Colonel Lipsett, 90th Winnipeg Rifles, 8th battalion, perished from the fumes, and it was noticed that their faces became blue immediately after dissolution.

"The Royal Highlanders of Montreal and 13th battalion and 4th Highlanders, 15th battalion, were more especially affected by the discharge. The Royal Highlanders, which no doubt received a more poisonous discharge was for the moment dismayed and indeed, their march according to the testimony of very hardened officers, became intolerable. The battalion retired from the trenches, but for a very short distance, and for an equally short time. In a few moments they advanced upon and occupied the trenches which they had momentarily abandoned.

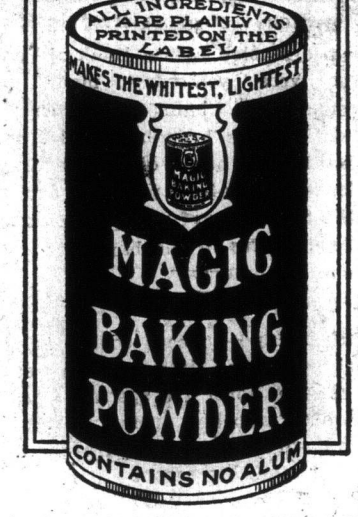
"In the course of the same night, the third brigade, which had already displayed a resource, a gallantry and a tenacity for which no eulogy could be expressed, was exposed (and with it the whole allied cause) to a peril still more formidable.

"It has been explained, and indeed, the fundamental situation made precarious, but the Canadians rose to the occasion.

"The last attempt of the Germans was materially reduced in strength on the left, but they managed to slip in between the wood and St. Julien and caused some anxiety in the long drawn out struggle, and indeed for the moment it looked as though the Canadians were lost.

"The stand made by the third brigade during this supreme crisis, and it is almost impossible to single out one single battalion without injustice to the others, but the efforts of the Royal Highlanders of Montreal, thirteenth battalion, were only equal to those of other battalions, which did

much heroic service.

"Joe Norworth, almost disabled by a bullet wound, was bayoneted and killed while he was rallying his men with easy cheerfulness. The case of Captain McCutcheon, of the same battalion, was not less glorious, although his death can claim no witness. This most gallant officer was seriously wounded in a hurriedly constructed trench, at a moment when it would have been possible to remove him to safety, he refused to be moved. But the situation grew instantly worse and orders were issued for an immediate withdrawal. But he knowing, it may be better than they, the exertions which still lay in front of them and unwilling to inflict upon them the disabilities of a maimed man, very resolutely refused and asked of them one thing only, that there should be given to him as he lay alone in the trench two loaded Colt revolvers to add to his own, which lay in his right hand as he made his last request. And so, with three revolvers ready to his hand for use, a very brave officer waited to sell his life dearly, wounded in an abandoned trench."

GERMANS INVADE

that the German fleet was out and had shelled Dunkirk on the North Sea coast of France; but it transpired that by some means not yet explained the Germans had brought up their big land guns within range of Dunkirk and thrown shells into it and killed two persons and wounded 45.

Another report had it that the Germans had been seen off the coast of Belgium, but as British warships were bombarding Zeebrugge during the greater part of last night and again today, this seems doubtful.

Another sensation came from the East, where it was announced that German cavalry which succeeded apparently in getting around the extreme right of the Russians had invaded the Russian Baltic provinces. There has been no indication in what force the Germans are operating but it is presumed here that the cavalry is simply looking over the ground to find out what opposition a force landed at Polangen, in the province of Courland, would meet with. In military circles here it is asserted that this cavalry can, however, interfere with Russian communications and give the famous Russian Cossack something to do.

line the Russians are reported to be continuing to make slow progress in Usok pass, and to repulse Austrian attacks on their flanks in the direction of Strv.

In reply to the Zeppelin visit to the county of Suffolk, England, early this morning, allied airmen have visited Belgium and bombarded Ostend and other towns, and also attacked towns in Southern Germany.

Nothing of importance has occurred along the western battle front. The Germans claim to still hold bridge heads on the Yser canal at Het-Sas and Steenstraete. They are being attacked by the allies, who, according to all the official reports are on the offensive at most points. The Germans report repeatedly refers to the repulse of the allied attacks.

German submarines have shown a slight revival in activity. They have sunk the trawler Lilly Dale and the collier Mobile, and the American steamer Cushing.

AUSTRIAN WAR REPORT.

Vienna, April 30.—The following official war statement was given out here tonight:

"The general situation is unchanged. During the day artillery engagements and minor skirmishes only were reported.

"Several Russian night attacks in the Orava and Opir valleys (in the Carpathians) were repulsed with severe Russian losses."

PLEW OVER SUFFOLK.

London, April 30, 11 p.m.—Four Zeppelin dirigible balloons flew over Lowestoft, Suffolk County tonight, according to unofficial reports.
