FROM CALGARY-Mr. James Smith who left here recently for the West, writes as follows to a friend in Sack ville concerning Calgary. Mr. Smith is now at San Francisco

is now at San Francisco:

"This is a great grazing country and the finest cattle at our fall fair would not compare favorably with the range cattle here and you can see at any time beef at the butcher's stall weighing about two to three hundred pounds to the quarter from three year old steers killed right off the grass. Last week the Cochrane ranche shipped 1073 head, making three train loads and valued at \$50,000 here and the Waldron ranche forwarded about 800 head in two train loads direct to the English market, but strange to state the prices of beef to the consumer here is about as high as in New Brunswick, 10 to 15cts. per lb, while at the small towns on the borders of the ranches it is higher, and lamb and mutton are only eater by those who have piles of money. I should judge by seeing the poor cuts in a quarter of mutton retail at 18 cents per lb, at Leth-bridge. Nearly everything is higher out here than further east, especially in the country districts removed from the failway, where extortionate prices prevail, but along the main line of the C. P. R., they are not as high as I was led to believelybefore coming here, but business appears to be good and most of the business people are very enthusiastic for the future. business people are very enthusiasti
