### Darieties.

OFFICERS IN THE TIME OF GUSTAVUS ADOLPHUS.

An officer of rank always hung a gold chais over his gorget; and cavaliers were usually apparelled in the richest stuffs, and wore the most beautiful armour which the forges of Parma and Milan could produce. A general was always armed cap-a-pie. The military scaff was usually scarlet. Their jackboots were so thick, that they resisted pistol shot, and were accounted with enormous spurs, having each six rowers, measuring three inches from point to point, and projecting from a ball of bell metal, within which were four tron drops, to jingle when the wearer rode or walked. The infantry were divided into two distinct classes: musketeers clad in helmets, gorgets, buffocats, and breastplates, armed with match-lock muskets, swords, and daggers; and pikemen, similarly clad, but armed with swords and pikes, varying from fourteen to eighteen feet long. The corslets were made larger than before, to cover the well-padded doublets; and thicker, to resist the dint of bullets. The plumed morion—acorn shaped, and having a gilt rim turning up in front—was the favorite head-dress both for horse and foci; and save some prince, or officer of high military rank, few wore the vizor or close helmet. The hair was worn cut short, a la soldat; but long moustachios, like long awords and spurs, were quite the rage.—Memoirs of Sir J. Hepburn.

WHEREAS my attention hath been called to a Letter which appeared in the \*\*Letter\* Letter\* Control of the Soft ultimo, addressed to the Editor thereof offering to the reading public of this Island "the declaration, qualification and obligation," copied (as the letter states) erebatis, from the Laws of the Orange Association of British North America: And whereas I would have considered it unnecessary to notice the letter and documents alluded to, had I not assertained, that they had been published by the authority of a Member or Members of an Orange Association which it is alleged, has been formed and now exists in Charlottetown, in this Island; and had I not also observed it stated on the same authority, that "the \*\*Lastitution\* in these Colonies can sever be suppressed, but by means which would subvert the Constitution and annihilate the connexion with the mother country:" And whereas such an assertion may tend to mislead the Inabitants of this Colony, where no laws at present exist applicable to such Societies,—and none, I trust, will become necessary; and whereas such an assertion is not founded in fact, as unlawful Societies, in a neighbouring Province, are defined by Statute, and among other things, it is enneted, that "corry Society or Association, the \*\*Members whereof, or any of them, take and subscribe or assent to any engagement of Secrety, Test or Declaration not required by Law (with the exception of acknowledged Lodges of Free Masons, to which the Law does not extend); and under the above Statute, Offenders convicted thereof are subject to transportation or imprisonment:

1 have, therefore, thought fit, by and with the advice and concent of her Majesty's Executive Council, to publish this Proclamation; and earnestly recommend Her Majesty's subjects in Prince Edward Island to discourage all such Societies, and not to join Orange, Ribbon, or any Society, where oath, obligations or tests are imposed on their Members, which are not authorized or required by Law; and I woul PROCLAMATTION.
