PRESIDENT OF COUNCIL.—We have been re-
peatedly asked, what right Mr. George Coles
has to attach to his name the title of President
of Council; to which we can only make answer
that in our opinion he has no such right.
There is no such office as President of the Ex-
ecutive Council, as far as we have been able to
learn, and it is almost impossible that there
should be. Without the Elect. Governor or the
Executive Council have no existence as a body,
they are merely his advisors, without whose
sanction nothing they determine upon is of any
value. The Elect. Governor, or administrator
of the Government, for the time being, is the
President of the Council; and it is a piece of
assumption quite worthy the ignorance of Mr.
Coles, his asserting his right to a title which
has no existence except in his own vain and
overheated imagination.
