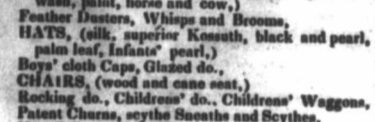

The political institutions, the commercial progress, and the industrial resources of the Colonies engage his attention; and he does not hesitate to express his clear opinion that it is essential to the cause of freedom in the American continent that the Provinces which are now British should remain so. Yet he regards their retention as next to impossible unless institutions are conferred upon them better suited to their advanced condition than those which they at present enjoy. To do justice to the Colonies, and at the same time to maintain the integrity of the Empire, he proposes a legislative union of all the Provinces; the appointment in England of a separate Secretary and Under Secretary of State, to attend exclusively to the affairs of these Colonies; the establishment of a Regency, to be held by a Prince of the blood royal; the organization of a Provincial Army; and the admission of the French Canadian to suitable honours and dignities; and all his propositions he supports by arguments drawn from experience and from a long acquaintance with the feelings of the Colonies themselves. The book demands an attentive perusal, and the reader who studies it with any care will find himself well rewarded."—*London Morning Post*, July 31st. 2m8
