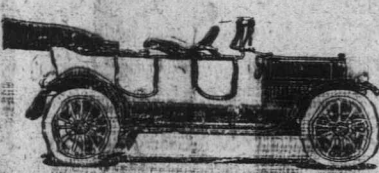
A LONG-DISTANCE TRAVEL.

LIVELY CRICKET GAME AT RIDLEY COLLEGE

Old Boys Return for Annual Event Which was Much Enjoyed by Spectators.

The Old Boys' game at Ridley College, the first since the outbreak of the war, was revived Saturday.

The game started in the morning with the Old Boys batting first. One hundred and thirty five runs were piled up before the tenth wicket. The Ridley team found the runs very hard to make at the beginning of their inning, but when Barr came in the appearance of things was changed giving the team more confidence as their tenth wicket fell with 135 to their credit.

The Old Boys' team, which was, with one or two exceptions, composed of old cricketers, made an excellent start by making 30 runs before their first wicket fell. Ridley made a poor start, her first two wickets falling for two runs.

For the Old Boys Mr. M. Harcourt 14; M. McCulloch 52, including 6 fours; L. McCulloch 15, and E. Lefroy 11, were the high scorers.

Fiddling on the part of both teams was good, but although Lefroy and Greening, the bowlers for the Old Boys' team, had not twirled the sphere for many years, they had little difficulty in taking the students' wickets.

The National Lacrosse Union opened its season Saturday, when Nationals beat Ottawa and Shamrocks won from Cornwall.

The Ontario Amateur Lacrosse Association season opened Saturday at Milford, when the home team beat Woodbridge, 5 to 2.

Four world's spring records were lowered by University of Pennsylvania Athletics in the Meadowbrook games at Philadelphia on Saturday.

R. B. Rice, rink of the Queen City Bowling Club lifted the Bowman Trophy in a match at Guelph. Three challenges are already in the hands of the trustees.

LACROSSE PLAYERS MUST STAY OUT

The Ontario branch of the Ontario Amateur Lacrosse Association has refused the application for reinstatement of the lacrosse players from St. Catharines and Toronto, who played in the professional lacrosse league last summer under the rule which requires a suspended athlete to remain out a specified time before his application can be considered.

A meeting of the officers and representatives of senior clubs of the O. A. L. A. will be called for Monday or Tuesday night to discuss the situation.

CANADA'S BIG FISH PONDS

Canada has the greatest fish ponds in the world. The deep sea description have a coast line of five thousand miles on the Atlantic and seven thousand miles on the Pacific, while the fresh water lakes have an area of not less than two hundred and twenty thousand square miles. From these "ponds," not taking into account the catch of the sporting fishermen, over fifty million dollars' worth is annually obtained and marketed.

RETURNED MEN ON CANAL

Contractors on Big Work at Welland Employ Many Soldiers.

Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways, stating that of 63 men employed on the Welland canal in staff positions, 57 are returned men. "Of 681 skilled workmen employed by the contractors 219 are returned men," said the Minister, "while out of 1,199 unskilled men 228 are returned men."

Corn Tassel won the historic Suburban Handicap at Belmont Park. Commander J. K. L. Ross' Boniface was third. The winner ran the mile and a quarter in 2:02.5.

Baltimore's two defeats at the hands of Jersey City yesterday resulted in the Birds and Lea, tying for the leadership. Toronto broke even with Rochester here on Saturday. Yesterday's game at Rochester was prevented by rain.

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CANADA AS A BEAR LAND

There one will find grizzlies and silver tips, browns and blacks and grays, and all the sub-varieties in between, including Teddy and Johnny rubs, among the children. All of these specimens may be seen in the interesting Zoological gardens at Banff, where they are lined up like soldiers on parade, in front of their cages—especially as dinner time nears.

That led to some great bear stories that night around the campfire by our guide, who is a hunter as well as a prospector and mountaineer. One especially gave us lively nightmares, and a long struggle he had, along and
