

On January 1st this year our total investment in tele phone properly-buildings, equipment, tools and sup. plies, plus what it has cost in actual cash to put this working equipment into service-was \$51,458,306. On the same date we had in operation 337,476 telephone

This means an investment of \$152 for each telephone instrument in service.

What has been provided for this investment of \$152 per telephone?

Here are some of the things :

An exchange telephone system in thousands of cities, towns and villages in Ontario and Quebec with sub. stantial fire-proof buildings the last word in sanitation and couvenience; 96,750 miles of Long Distance wire on 9,500 miles of poles; 587,000 miles of wire in underground cables; many hundreds of miles of wire providing party service to tural communities besides exchange and pole line facilities to give exchange connection to 720 local telephone organizations serving over 103,000 subscribers, mostly larmers.

It takes some 11,600 telephone workers to operate the system and their wages in 1919 totaled \$9,400,000.
