

We will then have three distinct breeds of fish, viz. the Miranichi, Restigouche and River St. John, and the outcome will be awaited with no

Very little illegal fishing was done, and what was reported came from settlers at the head of the river. The guardians fairly fulfilled their duties, but one or two men had to be exchan ged for others more efficient.

The total cost of the protection this year was \$630. 61 and of this sum \$310. was contributed by Alexander T. Wood, the expert angler of Boston, who represents the Clearwater and Burnt Hill Clubs, and to whose generosity the protection of the River is mainly due.

I cannot close this report without expressing my appreciation of the services rendered by Mr. Orr, the Fishery Overseer who frequently went over the entire length of the river and aided me in successfully carrying out the work. He was well sustained by head guardian always full and complete.
