MA. PATTERSON, the Protectionist Grit M. P. for South Brant, Ontario, in his speech on Wednesday night in the Market Hall, entered into a lengthy disquisition upon the iniquity of the Government's transactions with the Pacific Railroad Company.

FACTS FOR THE PEOPLE.

The statistics show the following facts:

1st. Under Grit rule the deposits in the Savings Banks increased annually at the rate of 1.22 per cent. Under the protective policy, even with the experience of the most adverse harvest Canada had had for a dozen years, the deposits in the savings banks increased at the rate of 1.45 per cent a year.

2d. The average decrease in the circulation during Grit rule was \$1,832,898 a year. The average increase in the circulation under the protective policy has been \$2,371,473 a year.

3d. The deposits in the chartered banks only increased 9 millions during the Mackenzie regime. The increase of 31 millions during the protective period.

4th. The business of the country has increased under the protective system so greatly that on June 30th last it required 13 million dollars more in Government notes than it did at the end of Grit rule.

5th. Trial by results the fiscal policy of the present Government is infinitely superior to the trade policy of the late Government.

6th. With such results before them the people should hesitate a long time before taking the Grit party to their hearts.

7th. Some of Mr. Welsh's Grit supporters are pursuing a most contemptible line of canvass against the County of Queen's County.
