Dr. Ryerson died on Sunday morning, after a protracted illness. Adolphus Exerton Ryerson, D. D., LL. D., was March 24th, 1803. Hewas the British army in America during the e outlinary war, and after its close emgrated first to New Brunswick and af arwards to Upper Canada. He reing for some years entered the ministry in the Weslevan Methodist Church in 1825, and remained in the itinerancy til 1829, when he aided in founding, and for ten or twelve years edited, the Guardian, the organ of the Wesleyan Methodists of Canada. In 1833 and 1836 he was sent as a delegate to the British Wesleyan Conference, and in 1841 was appointed Principal of Victoria College, Cobourg. In 1844 he was appointed Superintendent of Public Schools for Upper Canada, and the next year made an extensive tour of observa ion in the United States and Europe on he subject of Public School education. In 1847 he published a full report of his tour and a plan for the organization of a Public School system, which was adopted, and which he has since that time zealously striven to perfect. He wrote largely, mostly on educational topics, and conducted many important contro-versies with those who assailed his sys-
