"Ranger," "Iceland" and "Falcon" Still Jammed.

> (Special to the Evening Telegram.) GREENSPOND, Saturday Night.

A light breeze has been blowing from the northeast all day and the weather is fine and mild, but the Bay continues packed with ice. It is reported that a barque-rigged steamship hove in sight off Cape Freels yesterday, with one staysail set. She is still visible about fifteen miles from here this morning, in an eastnorth-east direction.

Numbers of ice-partridge and other birds have lately been killed in this neighborhood, and many bedlamers seen at the Cape.

There appears to be no possibility of the steamers " Ranger," " Iceland" and " Falcon" getting off yet.

FROM THE WEST COAST. The Outlook at Channel.



do know, that the French will not allow the settlers to establish lobster factories, except as a favor in some unfrequented localities. Some people talk about British gunboats protecting the British flag, &c., but how many a poor Newfoundland fisherman could tell a tale of being towed out of his own harbor by French men-of-war. It has been done hundreds of times, and will be done again. Not more than three years since a whole fleet of Newfoundland vessels were driven out of St. John Islands Bay, and ignominiously driven out too, by the French man-of-war, and when they called on the British vessels for protection they were laughed at and told they had no busines; there. L t some of the Government memb rs who laugh at French retaliation charter a vessel and go on the so-called French Shore on a fishing voyage for cod, lobsters, &c., and they will come home wiser and sadder men. The French have been attacked and defied by the passage of the "Bait Act." The fishing interest is strong enough in France to cause measures to be adopted for the enforcement of their treaty rights that will bring pov-

erty and distress and consequent depopulation to all the districts on the French Shore. Whether they will enforce their rights, we cannot say; but their rights have always been allowed on the FRENCH SHORE.
