Steamer Abandoned Off Cape Race.

NEW YORK, March 4.—The Russian steamer Korea, buffeted by storms on the North Atlantic, and pounded into helplessness by heavy seas, was abandoned by her crew on March 1st and left to her fate. She was sinking fast when her men left her. The Korea's crew of 48 men were taken off by the Anchor Line steamer Caledonia, and are on their way here. News of the disaster of the Korea was flashed here today in a wireless message from the Caledonia off Cape Race. The rescue was effected at a point about 300 miles E.N.E. from Cape Race. The Korea sailed from Sarbh, Norway, on Feb. 15th for Philadelphia with a cargo of iron ore. From the meagre story told in the wireless message to the agents of the Anchor Line here today it was only possible to gather the outline of how the staunch Russian steamer met her fate. When the Caledonia encountered her, however, the crew were getting ready to abandon her and take to the boats.

Reform of the Lords. The Government's Proposals.

LONDON, March 5.

The Times this morning hopes to give an outline of the Government's intended bill for the Reform of the House of Lords. It states that if the ministers are able to secure the abolition of the Lords' Veto of finance and legislation they will introduce a bill to reconstruct the Upper House on a democratic elective basis. The new chamber would be a small one, having no Veto power on financial bills; but where a deadlock of the chambers under any legislation, the two houses would sit and vote together. Thus any government having a respectable majority in the House of Commons would be in a position to carry its legislative proposals.

Coal Settles With Steel For \$800,000.

MONTREAL, March 4.

Another stage in the Steel-Coal negotiations was reached to-day at a meeting of the two Boards of Directors. The vexed question of the damages, which were claimed by the Dominion Iron and Steel Co., the balance of which damage amounted to \$1,201,000, was settled. A compromise has been made at \$800,000, which no doubt will meet with the entire approval of the shareholders of both companies. Another decision reached by the Directors of the Steel Company this morning was of tremendous moment to the shareholders. This was no less than the resolve to pay off the deferred dividend. Dividends on the preferred stock amount to nearly one-third of the value of the stock. The rest of the Steel-Coal points have been held in abeyance till further conference can be given the respective conditions surrounding both companies.

75,000 Sympathisers Go Out on Strike.

PHILADELPHIA, March 4.

Encouraged by messages of sympathy and offers of assistance from labor organizations in all parts of the country, the Union workers of many trades ceased work at midnight and inaugurated what promises to be one of the greatest sympathetic strikes in the history of organized labor. The committee of ten engineers, leading this big strike say at least 75,000 organized workers as well as many unorganized sympathisers of the street car men have already ceased to work. Promptly at midnight Union orchestras playing at the leading hotels and cafes picked up their instruments and started for their homes. Union cab drivers and chauffeurs also abandoned their posts, and the electric cab and auto service was badly crippled. The drivers of both taxicab services in the city are members of a Union and refused to take out their machines after the strike had gone into effect. The committee of ten remained in session at headquarters all night receiving reports from the various local unions. The leader refused to comment on the report that the police officials would prevent the demonstration planned for to-morrow afternoon in Independence Square. Rioting to-night was particularly severe in the Northeastern District, and it is thought to be a forerunner of serious trouble to-morrow when thousands of idle men will throng the streets. While the labor leaders are receiving support from their fellow workmen in all parts of the country, many associations of employers have sent letters and telegrams to the officials commending the stand taken by them and asking them to stand firm in their determination not to submit to the strikers' demands.


