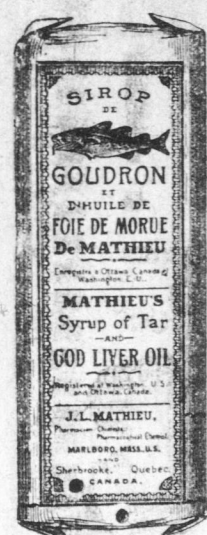

PRIZE DISTRIBUTION.

THE E. M. F. IS COMING. Reminiscence of Mr. Denis Shea.

In connection with the death of Mr. Denis Shea, the venerable President of the Irish Society of Conception Bay, Mr. H. F. Shortis relates a pleasing reminiscence. Some fifteen years ago His Grace Archbishop McDonald, who was the Bishop of Hr. Grace, visited Rome in connection with business affecting his diocese and had a private audience with the late Pope, Leo XIII. In talking over matters relating to the Catholic Church in his jurisdiction the Bishop referred in a casual way to the goodness of Mr. Shea, who had presented bells to the Cathedral and otherwise materially helped the cause of religion. His Holiness listened attentively to the recital of Mr. Shea's many benefactions, when, calling a Secretary, he commanded him to procure a beautiful picture which he asked the Bishop to present to his generous old friend with his (the Holy Father's) blessing. The picture was addressed in the Pope's handwriting to "Our beloved son, Denis Shea." The foot of the picture bore the sign manual of the illustrious Pontiff. It was delivered by the Bishop to Mr. Shea on his return, and the picture, which was beautifully framed, was carefully treasured by Mr. Shea up to the time of his death, and this souvenir of the kindness of His Holiness occupied a position of prominence in the household of the patriarch.

A SPEECH VERY SIGNIFICANT.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.
Significant interest is attached to the speech in the Lower House of the Japanese Diet, at Tokio, to-day, by Minister Komura, Minister of Foreign Affairs. "The relations of Japan with foreign powers," said Komura, "have been a steadily growing cordiality, unhampered by any incidents standing in the way of friendship. It is gratifying that Anglo-Japan friendship has been constantly gaining strength and solidity, and continues to be a powerful factor in the preservation of peace in the East. It appears that in some quarters this understanding has been looked upon with suspicion. I have no hesitation in declaring that it has for its sole object the maintenance of the Status Quo in Manchuria, and enduring peace in the Far East, by confirming the contents of the agreement of 1909."
