PARIS, Jan. 17.
Premier Poincaré was elected Pre-
sident of the French Republic by the
National Assembly, to-day.LONDON, Jan. 17.
Germany has consented to the pre-
sentation to the Ottoman Government
of the note decided upon by the Eu-
ropean Ambassadors. The delay of
notifying the Powers has not been
given.LONDON, Jan. 17.
At the annual meeting of the British
Law Association held this after-
noon, by an overwhelming vote the
motion to admit women to member-
ship was defeated. The motion was
favored by the junior barristers, but
turned down by the seniors.VERSAILLES, Jan. 17.
No claimant has yet appeared for
the first prize of 1,500,000 francs
in the recent Bank of Italy lottery. It
is believed the winning ticket may
have been lost when the Titanic sank
last April. It is recalled that a bunch
of tickets was sent to America on
the Titanic.LIVERPOOL, Jan. 17.
The captain and mate of the British
steamer Auchenard, perched on a
propeller 20 feet above the water,
refused to leave the vessel to-day
after she had sunk in the mouth of the
Mersey. She was in collision with the
s.s. Highland just after leaving Liver-
pool, during a dense fog. The Auchen-
ard sank almost immediately. The
other members of the crew were
brought to port.CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 17.
After the presentation of the col-
lective note by the Ambassadors, an
informal meeting of the Turkish min-
isters was held at the office of the
Grand Vizier. The discussion of the
note and the drafting of a reply was
postponed until to-morrow, when the
official council will be convened. The
ministers said Turkey cannot give
away on the question of Adrianople,
but some settlement may be reached
without this sacrifice.OPORTO, Jan. 17.
The British steamer Veronez,
wrecked near here yesterday, is still
in a precarious position. Contrary
to previous reports, only a few of the
129 passengers have been saved. The
only life line connected with the ves-
sel to the shore, broke after 23 of
those on board, mostly women and
children, had been saved. The sea has
become more moderate, and efforts
are being made to get another line
from the shore to the ship.WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.
A resolution congratulating the
British House of Commons and the
Irish people on the passage of the
Home Rule Bill, was introduced in
the House to-day by Representative
Goodwin, of Arkansas. The resolution
declared that the Irish struggles
for freedom appealed to all true Am-
ericans, and congratulated England
and Ireland on the passage of the Bill.
It was decided that the Secretary of
State forward copies of the resolu-
tion to Premier Asquith, John E. Red-
mond, and Chief Secretary Balfour.
A cablegram was sent by Representative
Donahue, of Pennsylvania, to John E.
Redmond, congratulating him for
friends of Ireland in the American
Congress upon the passage of the Bill.

At the City Hall.

The weekly session of the Municipal
Council took place yesterday after-
noon.The Board of Works Secretary com-
plained of the insufficient supply of
water to the General Hospital. The
Engineer stated that the institution
was formerly supplied from George's
Pond, but it became unsanitary and the
water from the city service had to be
used. Dr. Brehm will analyze the
George's Pond water and Engineer
Ryan will investigate the city short-
age.Colonial Secretary Watson acknowl-
edged receipt of \$1,177.66 as one
half of taxes collected for motors in
the city. He asked to see a detailed
statement as to how taxes were col-
lected.Engineer Ryan submitted plans of
extension to Post Office. Deferred.
A letter was received from Miss
Margaret O'Hara claiming over-taxa-
tion. A special meeting will be held
to discuss the claim.The Electrical Supt. of the Reid
Co., wrote saying it would cost \$50
to repair electrical service at the
Sanitary Station and yard.The Engineer reported an over-
supply of water at the Reid Co's
Round House and Dry Dock. He sug-
gested sea-water to Mr. Reid, who
agreed.Mr. M. F. Caul asked for street line
on Bannerman St. and Mr. Greene to
make alterations to stable on Cath-
arine Street. Referred to Engineer.
The water inspector reported
that several people were violating
the law. The Secretary will write
them. The meeting closed at 5.30.

Nickel Crowded.

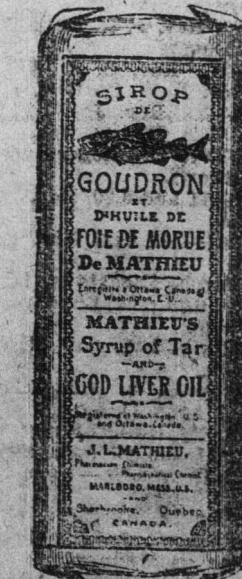
Patrons of the Nickel were given a

Why Who's Who.

The post of
leader of an am-
ateur brass band
is an onerous,
honorary and
sometimes or-
dinary position.
The leader is
supposed to beat
time with one
foot and bring
the straying
bremen back
into close con-
tact with the
right key by blowing the lining out of
a B-flat cornet. When, however, a
band is assembled whose members
figure on playing the same tune, the
position of leader is a soft and satisfy-
ing sinecure.One of the most highly-trained and
supple-limbed leaders of the present
era is John Philip Sousa, who is
known wherever the amateur clarin-
etist makes his hair. Mr. Sousa was
born in Washington at a youthful age,
and while still in his teens could be
seen flitting from place to place in
company with the artistic temper-
ment and a discouraging fiddle. He
used to tell the neighbors to sleep with
some sprightly variations on "Listen
to the Mocking Bird," while those who
couldn't sleep sat up in bed and uttered
unholy and spiteful remarks.At the age of seventeen, John Philip
became a conductor, having been
promoted over several head brakemen.
He is one of the few conductors in
history who can keep the alto and
tenor horns from falling several feet
below the pitch. He is also opposed
to playing the "Anvil Chorus"
whenever anything like an encore
comes along.When in the act of conducting a
subdued band through the key of six
sharps Mr. Sousa gives a clever imi-
tation of a human hay rake. He has
lateral, reverse, side and rotary ac-
tion, and when reaching for a pianis-
simo will stand on one protuberant
toe for several seconds at a time. He
achieves an impressive fortissimo by
jumping off the ground with intense
emotion and coming down on the
fourth beat of the measure, and usu-
ally succeeds in dislocating his back
hair and other articles of dress.Mr. Sousa has composed some pieces
which the silver cornet band has
decomposed to quite an extent. His
"Stars and Stripes Forever," for in-
stance, is played in several different
languages and fourteen different tem-
pos, and pursues the fleeing tourist
from Portland, Oregon, to Buzzard's
