**The Autocrat**

AT THE HOUSE.

We have on several occasions complained of the arbitrary acts of the Morris Ministry in the House of Assembly. We have pointed out that their conduct more nearly resembles that of a bureaucracy than the conduct of British Ministers responsible to parliament for their actions. It is time they were taught that Newfoundland is not Russia, and that the Newfoundland Ministry is not a Russian Bureaucracy.

We have shown how they have worse than ever. Members of the Opposition ask questions which in the usual way are set out in writing, and weeks pass without an answer being given to them by Ministers.

This year their conduct has been worse than ever. Members of the Opposition ask questions which in the usual way are set out in writing, and weeks pass without an answer being given to them by Ministers.

They treat the House of Assembly with contempt and contempt, and the rights of parliament are flagrantly disregarded, and in spite of this arrogant treatment of the people's representatives they have the temerity to hold themselves out as the People's Party.

Just as in Russia, at the head of an objectionable Bureaucracy, there is an Autocrat, so in Newfoundland we have at the head of this upstart political bureaucracy an autocrat whose conduct yesterday in the

House of Assembly outraged all decency, and respect for the rights of a representative of the people.

The people of St. Barbe complain that the close season for the killing of deer bears especially hard on them. They ask for an extension of six weeks from January 31st for their district. They point out that before the 31st of January they cannot go into the country for this purpose as they are engaged in the herring fishery. Their special need of venison is that other fresh flesh is almost unknown to them in winter. Their case has been set forth and vouched for by the Rev. Mr. Richards, a most conscientious clergyman, who has been amongst them for many a year and who knows their needs.

Moreover, they have approached the Legislature with petition for a redress of their grievances. The matter has been dealt with by the Inland Game Board and no redress furnished either by the Board or the Legislature.

Under these circumstances, Mr. Clapp brought up the matter yesterday, when a bill to amend the Game and Inland Fisheries Board Act of 1910 was in Committee of the House.

Instead of treating the appeal of the people of St. Barbe's with the consideration and respect due to the representation of their member, the Premier treated it with a brusque arrogance that is an insult to the district. A reference to our report of these proceedings will show that Mr. Clapp was treated with contempt, for which there was absolutely no excuse. He had done nothing to provoke the boorish attack but presented the case of his constituents to the House.

This would appear to have offended the autocrat who apparently imagines that the proper course for him to pursue as Premier is to insult an Opposition member who presents a case he finds inconvenient to answer. For answer it he did not. It was no answer to say that the law would permit men so circumstanced to kill deer. These men have to face the prosecution of the police if they kill the deer. They run the certainty of being hauled up if they do kill deer out of season and all the law the Magistrate is to give the Magistrate a discretion, which cannot be appealed against, to fine them or not just as he pleases, and the experience of men in this district has been most unfortunate. The discretion of the Magistrate has proved a delusion and a snare to them and they have good reason to ask for a change in the law.

**Disastrous Fire.**

House and Contents Destroyed—Old Couple left Penniless and Homeless.

The residence of John Lewis, a poor old fisherman, aged 76, was burnt to the ground at 8.30 last night with all its contents, and not a cent of insurance on house or furniture. The house which Mr. Lewis struggled to build for four years had just been completed and was situated on the Blackhead Road, inside of Cuddihy's quarry, on land which the man had cleared after his day's work. His wife being down town last night he left home to meet her and during his absence the place was set fire. It is thought, by some fire falling out of the store. Inspector Bambrick, to-day among the employees of the Council raised a few dollars to supply the old couple's immediate wants, but much more aid is necessary to help them. They are absolutely destitute, and the old man who is a type of the hard-working, independent fisherman of the Poor House where he and his wife must go he fears unless the kind people of the city will help him. We therefore commend the case to public consideration. Last night the old couple spent with friends on the South Side.

**Obituary.**

**HENRY GEORGE ADDY.**  
On Friday, 28th ult., there passed away at St. John, N.B., Henry Geo. Addy, son of the late Rev. John S. Addy, who was one of the pioneers of Methodism in Newfoundland. Mr. S. R. March, who has been in touch with the Addy family for some years, had a telegram from the late Doctor's son, George, who is also an M.D., informing him of the sad occurrence, "he deceased gentleman was born in Newfoundland and would be about 76. He has been practising in St. John, New Brunswick, for nearly 40 years. His father came to this country 15 or 20 years ago, and was the first Methodist missionary to visit Green Bay, going there in a schooner owned and commanded by the late Capt. Wm. Knight.—Com.

**JAMES YATES.**

The death occurred at his home, Gerald Street, Prince Edward Island, March the 17th, of James Yates, aged 78 years. Deceased was a native of Belfast, Ireland, but had been a resident of the island since 1870, going there from St. John's, Nfld. He was a veteran of the Crimean War, having taken part in the siege of Sebastopol as a private of the 62nd regiment, in which he enlisted when a lad of 17. During the siege, he distinguished himself by rescuing an officer, and should have won the Victoria Cross, but this honor passed to another. He received the Sebastopol and Turkish medals, an honorable discharge and a pension. After leaving the 62nd regiment he subsequently enlisted in the Royal Canadian Rifles. This regiment was at Malta in 1854. In the Crimea, in 1855 and Halifax in 1856. He had many interesting reminiscences of a private of the 62nd regiment, and was a strong Imperialist to the last. He leaves one son, Alexander, in P.E.I.
