LONDON, August 20.—
The Norwegian barque Britt, which left St. Andrew's Bay on December 2nd, for Buenos Ayres, is posted as missing at Lloyds.

LONDON, August 20.—
The Times editorially this morning makes a strong appeal for participation by the Dominion Government in the Panama Pacific Exposition.

LONDON, August 20.—
The report that President Huerta had granted an important railroad concession to an English group, headed by Lord Curzon, is emphatically denied by the latter.

ALBANY, August 20.—
Deputy Attorney General Kennedy for Sherbrooke this morning to represent the State in an effort to induce the Dominion authorities to return Thaw to New York State.

BUDAPEST, August 20.—
Count Stephen Tisa, the Hungarian Premier, fought a sword duel this morning with Marquis Paitawichna, a lieutenant in the Austrian Army. Both were slightly wounded. Cause of duel, law-suit.

EDMONTON, August 20.—
F. W. Cox, assistant manager of the John Walters Mills, accidentally shot and killed his wife with a revolver he had been cleaning. This afternoon, as he leaned forward to embrace and kiss her.

PARIS, August 20.—
An International Peace Committee, financed by Carnegie, and representing Britain, United States, France, Russia, Germany and Austria, will file an impartial enquiry into the alleged massacres during the Balkan war.

LONDON, August 20.—
King George, with four of his children, and Lord Rosebery spent a successful day angling for trout in Scotland. They had luncheon at the lake side, having lighted a fire in a gay style, over which Princess Mary cooked the trout for the party.

VANCOUVER, August 20.—
One hundred arrests have been made in the coal mine strike zone on Vancouver Island. Union's president in Ladysmith, Nanaimo and Albermarle are in jail charged with being. Charges of attempted murder and arson are to be laid against them.

LONDON, August 20.—
An astonishing state of affairs has come in the Society of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen, which has a membership of about 30,000. An expenditure of eighty thousand dollars since the Society's income last year has been followed by a compulsory levy for Secretary Fox.

MEXICO CITY, August 20.—
The Mexican Government sent to foreign legations here a note in which it was stated that negotiations between Lind and Huerta were continuing in a cordial manner. The latter also denied the report that the latter of the Interior had made a statement which might be regarded as an ultimatum to the States.

WASHINGTON, August 19.—
O'Shaughnessy, who is in charge of the American Embassy at Mexico City, has been named as Secretary of State by President Huerta and Mexican Minister Gamboa emphatically deny there was any foundation for the statement that Huerta has issued an ultimatum to the United States demanding recognition with the alternative of handing O'Shaughnessy his passports.

HALIFAX, August 20.—
The swept through thousands of Nova Scotia woodland yesterday, transposing picturesque landscapes into desolate wastes. The destruction appeared greatest in Hants County, where armies of farmers were forced to fight the flames to protect their homes and property. No fires are reported, but the atmosphere is ominous. In several sections the fate of villages hangs on a hair in the wind. Cochrane Island, a quarter of a mile from Bayside, was blown into a blaze, and in a few minutes ninety-nine acres of spruce forest were consumed.

VANCOUVER, August 20.—
Canada would withdraw from the Fisheries Treaty with the United States, unless Congress passed the International Commission Regulation next session, was the intimation made at the Canadian Club luncheon today by Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Hazen's intimation is that the Fisheries Commission will suffer from the lack of aid of Americans, cited the intimation being formed. This intimation made certain recommendations which were passed by the Dominion Government in 1910, but which have not yet been made law by the States.

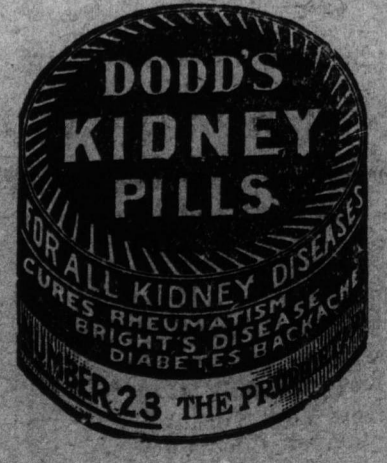
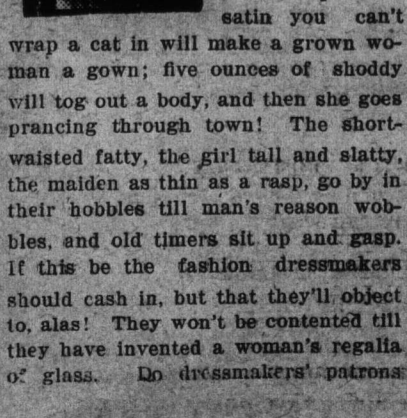
"Hour and twenty-five minutes, next train, sir," said the porter, as he turned into the porters' room on the little country station.

If more people would advertise by fits and starts, there would be more newspapers offered in even exchange for an equity in a second-hand graphophone.
