The Governor, Newfoundland: The French Government reports progress in Champagne maintained and extended. The French hold German lines six kilometres long and one kilometre deep. The German Guards regiment has sustained enornous losses. Some further prisoners were captured.

The Russian Government reported further progress on the Northern front. The enemy's attempts to approach Osowiec fortress have been repulsed.

In the Carpathians, successes have een obtained against the Austrians and Germans. In Eastern Galicia on the River Lownica, near Stanislau, the Austrians suffered a very serious reverse, losing six thousand orisoners, guins and transports HARCOURT

ALLIED SOLDIERS IN TURKEY LONDON, March 4.

Britain has landed her first troops or a land attack upon Constantiople. The military expedition not only relieves the sailors and marines who were previously put ashore to aid the warships in their campaign against the Dardanelles forts, but provides a mobile force for actual land operations by which the taking of Turkey in Europe from the Sultan is expected to be accomplished. The new force comprises French troops from Morocco, Canadians, Sengalese, native Egyptian troops in small num bers, and Australians. It is presumed that the major portion of this orce was quickly transferred from Egypt, where danger of a Turkish invasion by way of the Suez Canal as practically vanished. General D'Anade is the commander of the Allies' forces. With the arrival of the and forces it is expected that the advance in the Straits will be pushed nore rapidly. The military forces are being placed in possession on both sides of the Straits, the first landing aving been made on the Asiatic sid



ry are wanted, said Sir Edward Grey in the Commons to-day. The statement was made in reply to enquiries whether the Government was willing to invite suggestions from neutrals, with a view to avoiding further devastation of Belgium by the Great Powers, which are contending for its mastery. The only solution of the question, Grey continued, is the evacnation of Belgian territory by the German troops, restoration of her independence, and reparation for the wrong done her. Unless the neutral powers are prepared to assist in seuring this solution, I don't see what could be gained by the course suggested.

C.P.R. LINER MAKES TRIAL TRIP.

LONDON, March 4. Danger from submarines did not deter the Canadian Pacific Railway from carrying out the usual trial of the new 13,000 ton liner Metagama, vesterday. A large party was aboard for the trial run on Firth of Clyde The trial was successful in every way the new liner attaining a speed of 171/2 knots.

THE BOER REBELS.

NEW YORK, March 4. A news agency here has received the following despatch from Cape Town, South Africa, to-day: Ten thousand Boer rebels were taken prisoners during the recent rebellion against the authorities of the Colony, and the losses on both sides totalled one thousand. The rebels will be imprisoned until the end of the European war, the Government announced, owing to the impracticability of meting out adequate punishment at this ime; 293 ringleaders will be tried at
